## E. A. MARCOTTE FUNERAL WILL BE SATURDAY

Heart Ailment Is Fatal to Local Attorney  
AT BAR 34 YEARS

Funeral services for E. A. Marcotte, 57, Kankakee attorney for 34 years, died Wednesday afternoon at his home, 955 East Court street, after a short illness of heart ailments. He was especially well known among Kankakee's French population, having served as national vice president of L'Union St. Jean Baptiste d'Amérique for a term of eight years. Formerly village attorney for Bradley, Bourbonnais and St. Anne, he also served as master in chancery for one year under Judge A. W. DeSelm.

Funeral services will be conducted at 10 o'clock Saturday morning from St. Patrick church and interment will be in Maternity cemetery, Bourbonnais. The body will be removed at 6 o'clock this evening from the Hickey funeral home to the residence where friends may call.

Hendaye, France—(At the Spanish Front)—July 14—(AP)—A sudden insurgent advance down the Teruel highway past Sarrion endangered strong government positions about Mora de Rubielos today, and threatened to trap thousands of militiamen holding that spearhead of resistance.

After a night of fighting, the insurgents reported they had passed the village of Albentosa, junction of the main Teruel-Valencia highway with the military supply lead leading north to Mora de Rubielos. ## Union Agent Is Arrested For Threats

## AERIAL BOMBS KILL MANY IN CANTON, CHINA

Japanese Renew Attacks Third Successive Day

Canton, China, July 14—(AP)—Japanese aerial bombs killed probably 150 persons and injured 500 others in this South China city today, the third successive day in which Japanese warplanes have attacked.

Eighty-three dead were counted between the East Bund and Honam island alone as rescue squads pulled mangled bodies of men, women and children from wrecked houses.

The dead and wounded for the past three days in the Canton area were expected to total more than 1,500. There were 326 casualties by official count yesterday, including 240 killed when a bomb hit a concentration camp at Tsengcheng in South Kwangtung province.

Grossing scenes resembled those of last month's bombings in which hundreds were killed.

**37 Air-Raiders**  
Thirty-seven Japanese air raiders appeared shortly after daybreak, directing their attacks toward the Pearl river bridge and the old power plant.

Near the bridge, on the East Bund, one bomb struck the center of a crowded vegetable market, and 34 shattered corpses were counted there. The only living thing appeared to be a pet monkey, chained to a tree.

Crossing the bridge to Honam, one saw 49 bodies laid out on the sidewalk.

## LYONS RESENTS HORNER'S SLUR ON BACKGROUND

Calls Statement of Governor Vicious Snobbery  
POOR FAMILY

Rockelle, Ill. July 14—Richard J. Lyons, Republican candidate for United States senator, characterized Gov. Henry Horner's criticism of his personal background as an underhanded and vicious piece of snobbery based upon fear of defeat for Horner's new political machine.

"Mutual friends have assured me that upon notification of my nomination, the governor of Illinois had the ill manners and lack of common decency to say, 'It is too bad that the Republicans nominated Lyons. He is a disgrace to the Republican tradition. Why, he hasn't any social background!'"

"I haven't any social background! What does the governor mean by social background? If he means that I haven't sprung from a line of wealthy forefathers and don't have thousands and thousands of dollars in my name in the bank, then he's right. If he means that I sometimes don't pick up the right knife or fork, or that I don't own top-hat and tails, then he's right. If he means that I had to work for every dollar I ever got, that my father was a teamster and I was messenger boy, then he's right. Need This Type

"Since when has it come about that a man who works for a living is disqualified from holding public office? What we really need is more men who work by the sweat of their brow in public office. Then maybe there would be a greater appreciation of the values of money, and it wouldn't be wasted by billion after billion. If the tax-payers of the New Deal in Washington and Illinois were spending their own millions, and had had to work to get them instead of inheriting the fortunes built up by their fathers, then, perhaps, there would be economy of government and an attempt to balance the budget.

"That is too much to expect from a millionaire bachelor, I presume," Lyons said, referring to Gov. Horner. "A household budget is something he wouldn't know about. Nor how to raise 13 children, as my father did, on his meager salary as a teamster. No social background? Perhaps not, but my father at least had the social backbone to marry and raise a family.

Humphries said he was not certain what caused the Negro's mind to snap but had been told there had been several deaths in Register's family recently.

## C. I. O. Families Return to Town; Get Belongings

Westwood, Calif., July 14—(AP)—Small groups of C. I. O. unionists and their women and children, 750 of whom were driven from Westwood yesterday after a riot between lumber labor factions, straggled back today asking to be allowed to get their belongings.

One man was shot and 30 others were beaten in the street battle that almost brought national guard and coast artillery troops to this lumber company-owned town.

Sheriff's officers augmented by 800 deputized citizens, armed with rifles and clubs, and 20 state highway patrolmen, patrolled the town today. Local authorities said the returning C. I. O. families would be allowed to enter, one by one, and take their household possessions away with them.

The C. I. O. sawmill workers and their families camped on the highway last night between Westwood and Red Bluff, 80 miles west of here.

Red Bluff police drove the C. I. O. refugees out of town. They had planned to hold a mass meeting there last night.

A yesterday's street battle climaxed a strike called by the C. I. O. unionists Thursday night against the Red River Lumber company. The C. I. O. group had objected to a 17 1/2 per cent wage cut. The mills closed Monday.

Members of a company-organized union, the Independent Industrial Employees union, voted to accept the wage cut. After the mills were closed friction between the two labor factions grew.

More than 2,000 men engaged in yesterday's riot.

## CROWN PRINCE OF SWEDEN IN STATE 3 DAYS

Round of Festivities Planned by City of Chicago

Chicago, July 14—(AP)—Three members of the Swedish royal family arrived today for a three-day visit in Chicago, the largest metropolitan center of Swedes in the world outside of Sweden.

Several hundred cheering Swedish-Americans greeted Crown Prince Gustav Adolf, Crown Princess Louise and their son, Prince Bertil, and the royal suites.

Prince Bertil came by train from Detroit, arriving 15 minutes before his royal parents, who arrived by train from Washington.

The crown prince, gracious and smiling, wore a suit with a small white print figure on a black background, and a white sailor hat with a little black veil. The crown prince wore a grey business suit.

Prince Bertil waited at one station, then motored to the Union station to be on hand when his parents arrived.

**Official Greeting**  
They were greeted officially by Costa Oldenburg, consul for Sweden in Chicago. Their host for their Chicago stay, William McCormick Blair, was at the station.

## BREAKS RECORD OF WILEY POST BY MANY HOURS

Crossed Three Continents, 2 Oceans in Four Days

## GREAT TRIUMPH

Floyd Bennett Airport, New York, July 14—(AP)—Howard Hughes and his four fellow world-girdlers landed at Floyd Bennett airport at 12:37 p. m. c.s.t. today with a smashing new round-the-world record of less than four days.

The big silver monoplane circled the field twice before coming down to an easy landing before a widely cheering crowd.

The total elapsed time for the dash around the globe was set unofficially at 81 hours, 17 minutes, or three days, 19 hours and 17 minutes.

The multimillionaire speedster whipped in from the west under a threatening overcast sky with a record that more than halved the 7-day, 18-hour 49-minute round-the-world time established in 1933 by the late Wiley Post, a mark then regarded as sensational.

Aided By Tail Wind  
Hughes drove the ship at full speed on the last lap of the flight from Minneapolis to Floyd-Bennett airport, whence he took off at 5:20 p. m. c.s.t. Sunday. A spanking tail wind helped him along.

His speed for the elapsed time was approximately 161 miles per hour.

A fire whistle let go with a patch which had been down on the concrete runway, and taxied toward the administration building.

Tumultuous Welcome  
Hundreds of automobile horns joined in a tumultuous welcoming. Despite elaborate precautions to protect the plane, a surging crowd drove through to get a close-up glimpse of the unshaven, disheveled heroes.

Hughes apparently did not notice a patch which had been cleared for him and he taxied toward a commercial transport plane, which was immediately moved.

Hughes and his companions' last stop before New York was at Minneapolis, Minn., at 6:38 a. m. c.s.t., after a 2,441-mile flight from Fairbanks, Alaska, over the Canadian Rockies, down the great wastes of the Yukon and the barrens of northwest Canada.

After a 33-minute halt at the airport there they roared off at top speed for New York. A strong tail wind shoved the ship along at high speed over this 1,054 mile last lap.

25,000 on Field
