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Short Platform is Suggested for Republican Party

Peoria, Ill., Aug. 11.—(UPI)—The Republican convention state platform committee was urged yesterday to recommend a platform "short and to the point."

"The committee is holding a series of meetings to ascertain views on what the platform should contain. Recommendations will be made at the state convention here Aug. 31."

The contention of H. L. Greene, Urbana attorney, that a "short and concise program will be read by all the voters" was echoed by a number of speakers at an open forum today.

Greene declared that the people were being "misled by the national administration's great war cry of preserving democracy."

"The people no longer want a Democratic government, they want a representative government," Greene said. "It is the duty of the Republican party to state civil government."

Frank J. Smith of Detroit, assistant national administrator of labor policy, said he was in favor of the operation of the C.I.O.

The committee met in executive session yesterday afternoon with President Everett M. Dirksen of Peoria and Leo E. Allen of Galena, the principal speakers.

CROP ELECTION IN CORN BELT IS POSTPONED

Corn Estimate Short of an Excessive Supply

Washington, Aug. 11.—A corn self popularity test has been deferred at least until next year.

Secretary Wickard announced last week that the government corn marketing quota was made unnecessary by the bumper crop of corn which, estimated at the corn yield at 2,600,000,000 bushels, would supply the country for 1937-1938.

Take a year's example—Long Louie Warneke, one of the few reasons the St. Louis Cardinals are still in the National League, and Johnny Vander Meer, the double-no-hit kid, whose losing streak earlier in the year boosted the Cincinnati Reds into the money.
For weeks, Long Louie was getting exactly nowhere. And Frankie Warneke, who has enough worries (things being what they are) with the Gasless Gas House, had just the more reason for his bluish-gray looks.
It's not that the Cards are going anywhere at any great rate, even now. But still the all-star from Arkansas has returned to form, gone the route in five of his last six starts, allowed just eight runs in 52 innings and won four out of five, three of them by shutouts.

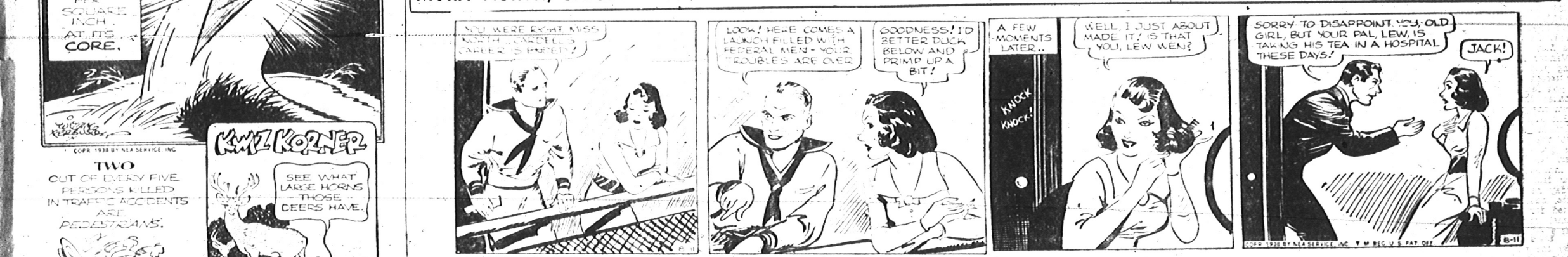

POPE'S DEFEAT IS A BLOW TO THE NEW DEAL

Clark, Conservative,
is Nominated
in Idaho

Washington, Aug. 11—(UP)—Idaho's Democratic primary today produced the first reduction in the New Deal's senate strength.
President Roosevelt lost a 100 per cent supporter in Sen. James P. Po, D., Ida., who was defeated by Rep. D. Worth Clark.
Of the senatorial contests in Tuesday's primaries the New Deal won in Ohio and Arkansas. In both the president had indicated his desire to have the incumbents, Sens. Robert J. Bulkley, D., O., and Hattie W. Caraway, D., Ark., re-nominated. During his recent transcontinental trip, he referred to both as his "friends."

Woman Wins
Bulkley was renominated by a two to one margin. Mrs. Caraway, however, was pressed harder by her opponent, Rep. John L. McClellan. On the basis of almost complete returns she held a small margin.
Mr. Roosevelt, on his way back to Washington after nearly a

month's absence on a fishing vacation, made no comment on the results. But they apparently had no effect upon his determination to urge the primary nomination of outright New Dealers, opposed by candidates he has described as "yes, but" supporters.
Entering Georgia yesterday, he declared for U. S. District Attorney Lawrence Camp, candidate for senator against Sen. Walter P. George. It was understood that in one of his two speeches today he would say more about his opposition to George.

New Deal Issue
The New Deal was a clear cut issue in the Idaho primary. National Democratic Committee Chairman James A. Huley had spoken in Idaho for the New Deal. Secretary of State Cordell Hull had praised his position on the administration's reciprocal trade treaty program.

In off year encounters with the conservative elements within the Democratic party, New Deal candidates have held their own in some places, but have failed to make an important gain in congressional strength and have lost several contests.

A Stunning Blow
Rep. Otha D. Wearin, D., Ia., failed, despite New Deal backing, to unseat Sen. Guy M. Gillette. Rep. Maury Maverick, D., Tex., lost his seat in the house to a less-than-100 per cent New Dealer. Rep. William D. McFarlane, D., Tex., like Maverick an enthusiastic Roosevelt supporter, will not return to the house unless he can win a run-off primary.

Meanwhile, Republican leaders hailed Pope's defeat as "another repudiation" of the New Deal. Republican National Committee Chairman John D. M. Hamilton described the results in Idaho as "the

most stunning blow the New Deal so far has received."

Pepsi-Cola Sues Coca-Cola Company

New York, Aug. 11—Suit has been filed in the supreme court of Queens county by the Pepsi-Cola company against the Coca-Cola company, asking for a restraining order to enjoin the Coca-Cola company from interfering with the Pepsi-Cola company, its subsidiaries and licensees throughout the U. S. Simultaneously with the filing of this bill of complaint, against the Coca-Cola company, a petition has been filed in the U. S. patent office in Washington by the Pepsi-Cola company attacking the validity of the Coca-Cola trade-mark. It is claimed that the trade-mark was obtained "through untruthful and fraudulent statements made in the application for trade-mark registration."

The petition further states that the names "Coca" and "Cola" are both descriptive names, public property, and, therefore, cannot be used exclusively by the Coca-Cola company.

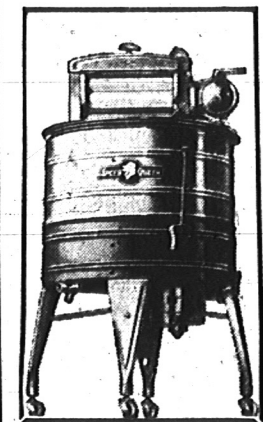

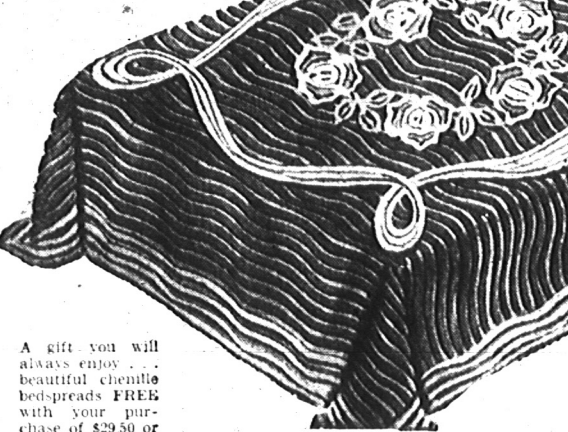
