Washington, Jan. 20.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, a prominent figure in a war-torn world, passed for a fourth presidential inauguration today at an intimate unique in history.

FDR Pledges Efforts To Just, Durable Peace

Takes Fourth Term
Oath In Simple
White House Ceremony

Washington, Jan. 20.—(UP)—Franklin D. Roosevelt, began his fourth presidential term today with a pledge that "we shall work for a just and durable peace as today we work and fight for a total victory in war."

But while a fourth term added to a third, stacked one broken precedent on another, the inaugural ceremony, held at 11 a. m. (east) was as old as the nation.

Religious services preceded the inauguration, again in accordance with custom. Familiar hymns, familiar biblical quotations filled the White House east room. There were prayers for our President and our country from the Episcopal book of common prayer. There were special prayers for victory, for "all in the service of the United Nations" and even for our enemies.

The Norris building, situated at the northeast corner of the busy intersection of Schuyler avenue and Court street, has been sold by the Norris estate to Myrtle M. Phifer of Chicago. The property transfer, recorded at the Kankakee county court house, indicated that the price paid is \$100,000.

The name of that firm, however, does not appear as a purchaser of the property.

Interested Here
Block & Kuhl, who operate stores in approximately 20 Illinois and Indiana cities, have been dickering for a Kankakee location since 1929 when they were interested in the purchase of the Gellino Brothers department store which occupied the location where now operates Ward & Company now operate in this city. Since that time the Peoria firm has negotiated on several occasions for Kankakee property, the latest visit having been made here only last fall. It is believed that the Norris property is suitable to their desires and plans.

The building is occupied on the ground floor by a clothing store, a candy store, a shoe repair shop and a lunch room. Upstairs are numerous offices, including the suite occupied by the Kankakee Chamber of Commerce.

Gordon Pattengale
Of Bradley, Missing
Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Pattengale, 154 South Euclid avenue, Bradley, received a telegram from the War Department today informing them that their son Pvt. Gordon L. Pattengale, is missing in action in Belgium.

Gordon entered the service Jan. 4, 1944 and was trained at Fort McClellan, Ala., and Camp Breckinridge, Ky. He went overseas in October 1944. Pvt. Pattengale attended Maitland high school and was employed at the General Foods plant prior to induction.

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Luzon, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Lt. Gen. Walter Krueger is winning the important battle of the left flank.

His sixth army is smashing Japanese tanks, silencing artillery concealed in caves and going after enemy soldiers in 10-foot-deep holes with flamethrowers. It is the first real fight since the Yanks landed at Lingayen Gulf Jan. 9.

600 Nips Killed
Twenty Japanese tanks have been knocked out and 600 Nipponese killed—some of them 23rd division troops from Manchuria—in a three-day period along the left flank.

That flank juts into the hilly, eastern side of Pangasinan province. The broader it gets the more effectively it isolates Japanese forces on the north around Baguio, Philippines summer capital, from other enemy forces on the south defending Manila.

Significantly, since the fighting flared up on the left flank, there has been scarcely any official word of a further push in strength southward by Yank columns last reported approaching Tiaic, 65 airline miles from Manila.

Scattered Clashes
The battle of the left flank is not a continuous engagement of massed forces but rather a scattered series of small scale, bitter clashes. The Americans are linking up a solid line along the Manila-Baguio road in a 30-mile stretch from near Rosario on the north to the Agno river on the south near Villasis.

From the north to south in that area, today's communique and Associated Press field dispatches reported:

The Japanese threw night counterattacks at Yanks in the outskirts of Rosario after a push east from coastal Damortis. The Nipponese were repulsed but artillery duels are continuing.

Four miles southeast, Yank columns moving north on the Manila-Baguio highway which leads in behind Rosario and captured Slon.

Ambush Falls
Further southeast down the highway (Continued on Page Two)

750 Flying Forts Bomb Rhineland

London, Jan. 20.—(UP)—More than 750 American heavy bombers with an escort of 550 Mustang fighters struck today at German supply and communications centers in the Rhineland.

American Flying Fortresses bombed the freight yards at Rheine, 25 miles north of Munster, the yards at Heilbronn, 25 miles north of Stuttgart, and the Rhine river railbridge at Mannheim.

The attack was designed to hamper German supply and communication with the western front.

Group To Finish
'Work-Or-Else'
Bill By Monday
Face Fight On
Farm Deferments,
Union Membership

Washington, Jan. 20.—(UP)—House military affairs committee members predicted today that they would finish writing a war-work-or-else bill Monday despite the fact that they still face "bloc" fights over questions of farm deferments and union membership.

A lively floor fight over the bill is predicted, with at least one committee member promising to oppose the measure when it comes before the house.

Substitute Penalties
The bill dropped its "work-or-else" tag late yesterday when the committee voted 15 to 2 to accept an amendment by Rep. Paul Kilgus, D. Tex., substituting civilian penalties for the army work-battalion draft proposed in the original measure.

The "draft dodger" penalties in the Kilgus amendment would make violators refusing to work at essential jobs liable to fines up to \$10,000 and imprisonment for not more than five years or both.

Jap Sub Sinks Liberty Ship Off West Coast

Machine Gun, Ram-
Survivors, Killing
10 Of 70-Man Crew

San Francisco, Jan. 20.—(UP)—A Japanese submarine, roaming the Pacific between Honolulu and San Francisco, torpedoed and sank the Liberty ship John A. Johnson last November and machinegunned and rammed survivors, killing at least 10 of the 70-man crew and wounding six others.

The incident, believed to be the first submarine action near the American mainland since Oct. 25, 1942, was reported yesterday in navy-sponsored interviews with survivors.

Hit Without Warning
The 60 survivors were spotted by search planes and rescued the following day by the navy motor yacht Argus.

The torpedo struck without warning and the men abandoned ship when she began to break up. A half hour later the submarine surfaced on the moonlit waters and crisscrossed the oil-smeared sea in search of survivors who hid behind floating sacks of flour and prayed.

The Japs gleefully ran up and down the ship.

Yank 6th Army Winning Battle Of 'Left Flank'

First Real Fight
Since Landing At
Lingayen Gulf

Rome, Jan. 20.—(UP)—Canadian infantry of the eighth army, supported by tanks, captured an enemy stronghold on the south bank of the Senio river opposite Fusignan, headquarters said today.

Germans infiltrated at the Senio at several other points but were driven back in a series of patrol clashes.

Tokyo Radio Speculates On New Invasion

Tank battles, artillery duels and bazooka charges flared along the northern Philippines battlefield as Tokyo radio speculated today on a possible new American invasion south of Manila.

But the Japanese high command showed greater concern over methodical Superfortress raids on the home islands and the unwillingness of Japanese to sign up as seamen aboard ships making suicidal runs into waters patrolled by U. S. submarines, planes and warships.

The emperor's government appropriated two billion yen (\$1,688,000,000) for bigger air raid defenses and shelters, some of which the Domei news agency said will become the permanent headquarters of governmental agencies.

These actions were announced as a single B29 reconnoitered the Tokyo-Yokohama area and the 21st bomber command at Saipan checked results of the first raid yesterday of Askashi.

Small but general gains were reported from Burma. Chinese were within a mile and a half of Wanting, last stumbling block to reopening the Burma road. Severe fighting flared around Lelyang, China, as the Japanese opened a drive to close a gap in the Canton-Hankow railway above Canton.

Machinist Is Killed When Struck By Car

The first automobile fatality in Kankakee in the year 1945 occurred about 9 p. m. Friday when Robert John McFarlane, 59, a machinist at the Bear Brand factory, was killed instantly at the intersection of Statton street and Wall avenue after being struck by an automobile driven by Raymond Mook, 21, of 230 South Fraser avenue.

Mr. McFarlane, who roomed at the home of Mrs. Henry Baron, 131 North Wall avenue, was crossing Station street from the south when the accident occurred. Corner Ed Madison stated that McFarlane left home about 6:30 p. m. to go up town and was returning home.

Thrown Onto Hood
The coroner and Deputy Sheriff Al Yung, who investigated the accident, stated that the victim was struck by the right front headlight of the automobile thrown on top of the hood of the car, and carried for several feet. One of his legs was torn off in the accident, it was reported.

The body was taken to the Hickey Funeral home and Coroner Madison stated he would hold an inquest.

Many Canadian
Home Defense
Troops AWOL

Ottawa, Can., Jan. 20.—(UP)—Half of the 15,600 Canadian home defense troops who were ordered overseas under the government's new compulsory overseas act, went AWOL from ports of embarkation and 6,900 of them still are missing, Defense Minister A. G. L. McNaughton announced today.

All the overseas-bound troops were given the customary final home leaves from embarkation points and 7,800 of them failed to return on time. A few have straggled back or have been apprehended since, but the large majority of them still are absent. After being AWOL for 21 days, they are listed as deserters, and McNaughton said that "disciplinary action will be taken against them under the provisions of King's regulations and orders."

Rolling Up New Conquests In Lower Poland, Slovakia

London, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The Russians have captured Tilsit, Joseph Stalin announced tonight.

The 13th century city of 60,000 population, had dated as a German stronghold since the days of the Teutonic knights. It was the scene of one of the bitterest German memories, the peace of Tilsit signed by Napoleon and Alexander the Great of Russia in 1807.

The city is 25 miles from the Baltic.

London, Jan. 20.—(UP)—Russian forces drove into the German border area about 200 miles from Berlin today, clamped a crushing pincer on East Prussia and swept westward in the Carpathians through the big transport centers of Nowy Sacz, Kassa, Presov and Bardeva.

Gen. Ivan Y. Petrov's Fourth Ukrainian army, bringing up the south wing of the record Soviet offensive, overran the Polish rail junction of Nowy Sacz, 47 miles southeast of Krakow, and the Czechoslovak cities of Kassa in the Hungarian border area, Presov, 20 miles north of Kassa, and Bardeva, 22 miles north of Presov.

Marshal Stalin issued a special order of the day announcing the conquests in lower Poland and Czechoslovakia, and ordered a salute of 20 salutes by 224 guns.

Drive Into East Prussia
Other Soviet forces gathered along a 60-mile stretch of the German border and drove into East Prussia from the south in a bid to trap the defenders of the German province.

The German high command reported that Marshal Konstantin K. Rokossovsky's army had overran southwestern East Prussia on a 37-mile front between Chorzel and Gligenberg, the latter only 71 miles from the Baltic.

Other Russian forces reached the area of Kepno, seven miles from the Silesian frontier, 43 miles east of Breslau, and 60 miles northwest of Czesochowa, the opposite end of a border sector into which the Soviets were flooding for an invasion drive which may have begun.

Five Red Armies
Moscow dispatches said five Soviet armies, striking progressively stronger blows, had set their sights on Danzig, Poznan, and Breslau as the next major objectives in their "winter victory" offensive, now in its eighth day.

Ernst Von Hammer, military commander for the official German DNB agency, acknowledged that Russian tanks had penetrated East Prussia from the south as far as Gligenberg, just inside the border at a point 90 miles south of Konigsberg and 85 miles southeast of Danzig.

The thrust represented a 14-mile advance north from the Polish town (Continued on Page Two)

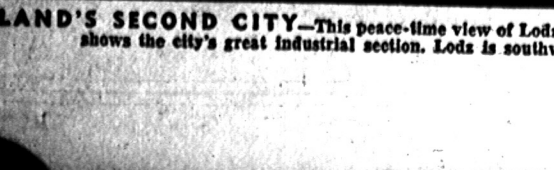

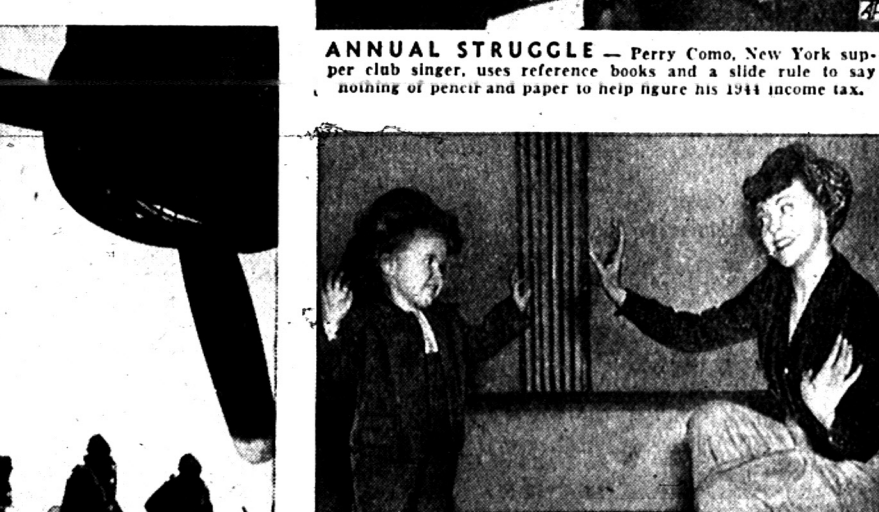

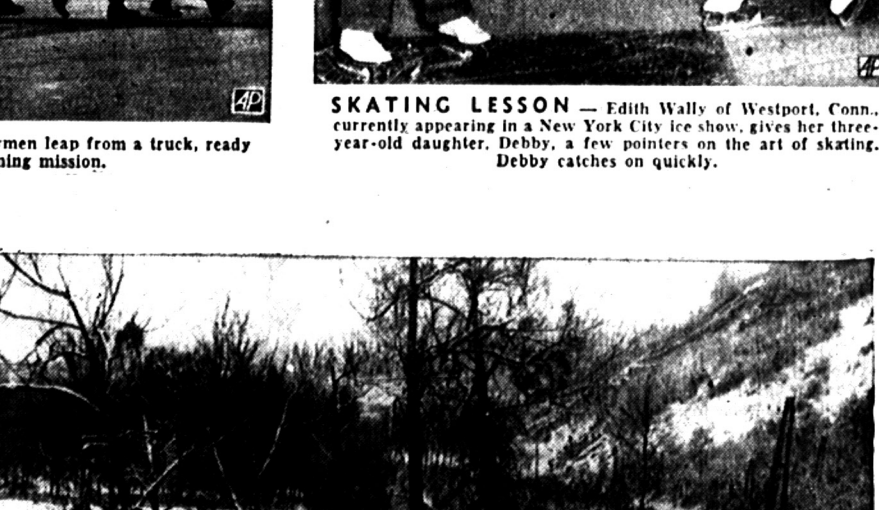
