Seek To Bar Bilbo At Senate Door

GOP Steering Committee Votes Action

Mississippi Senator
Accused Of Misusing
Office, Breaking Law

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The Republican steering committee recommended today that Senator Theodore G. Bilbo (D-Miss.) be barred at the door of the senate when he attempts to take the oath for a new term tomorrow.

Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) said the committee's recommendation would be laid before the full Republican membership of the senate at a meeting this afternoon.

Bilbo has been accused by an investigating committee of misusing his office and breaking the law in his relations with war contractors.

Taft indicated the possibility of an agreement with the Democratic leadership under which a threatened filibuster, which would delay organization of the senate, would be avoided.

He said no agreement had been reached with Bilbo yet but indicated the Republicans hope to come to an understanding with the Democrats on this point before tomorrow.

Taft told reporters a resolution might be offered to deny Bilbo his seat temporarily, with the understanding that this would have no bearing on the senate's final decision.

Previously, senators often have been barred "without prejudice" while their cases are decided.

The barring of Bilbo at the door would prevent the Mississippi senator from taking any part in senate discussion of the charges against him. Presumably, however, he would be represented by some other senators acting as his unofficial counsel.

The steering committee's recommendation was expected to be accepted by the full Republican conference later in the day.

At the same time, Senators Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) and Bridges (R-N.H.) scheduled an afternoon conference to discuss a proposed minority report of a special committee which investigated in Mississippi charges that Bilbo acted to prevent Negroes from voting in the primary where he was renominated.

The committee previously voted three to two, with Bridges and Hickenlooper dissenting, to clear

**811 Marriages,
219 Divorces
Here In 1946**

Both marriages and divorces hit record highs last year in Kankakee county but the number of nuptial knots tied outscored those untied by a bigger margin than the Illinois football team piled up yesterday against UCLA.

County Clerk Orville Warren's records show there were a total of 811 marriage licenses issued in 1946, 268 more than in 1945. Divorces were granted in 1946 to 219 husbands and wives, according to the files of Henrietta Carson, minute clerk of the circuit court. That reflects a ratio of nearly 4 to 1 for Dan Cupid.

Of course, when 93 permits were issued, was the busiest month at the marriage license window. February was next with 82 and May third with 77.

The largest number of divorces granted in any one month was September's 32. There were 28 decrees issued in April and 28 in January. The monthly score follows:

Bad Weather Cuts Holiday Death Toll

A sharp reduction in the number of violent deaths throughout the nation over the New Year's holiday compared to the heavy toll on Christmas was indicated in a survey today.

From 6 p. m. local time to last midnight at least 116 persons suffered violent deaths but in the same period last week at Christmas there were 297 fatalities. Traffic deaths led with 80 while 36 persons died from miscellaneous causes, including fires, falls, shootings and asphyxiation. Over the Christmas holiday there were 213 traffic fatalities.

Inclement weather in many parts of the country curtailed motor travel and was believed a big factor in holding down the number of traffic deaths. The National Safety Council had estimated that 130 persons would be killed in traffic mishaps on New Year's Eve and on the holiday. The council predicted the final total, including persons during that period but who die later, would be much higher.

California, which led the nation in the number of traffic deaths over the Christmas holiday with 70, also ranked first among the states with the most violent deaths over the New Year's holiday. Sixteen of the 23 violent deaths in California resulted from traffic accidents. Ohio was second with 13, including 12 traffic. Several states did not report any violent deaths.

Deaths by states, listing traffic and miscellaneous causes, included: California 16; Florida 1; Illinois 4; Indiana 4; Michigan 5; Minnesota 2; Missouri 2; New York 2; Ohio 12; 1.

Holy Land Faces Threat Of New Violence

Irgun Promises To Continue 'Warfare' For Free Palestine

Jerusalem, Jan. 2.—(UPI)—Two pamphlet bombs exploded in Jerusalem late today, marking the end of a shaky truce which brought peace to the holy land during the Zionist congress in Basel and the Christmas holidays.

Jerusalem, Jan. 2.—(UPI)—The threat of new violence hung over the holy land today as Irgun Zvai Leumi, rejecting an American congressman's plea for a truce, promised unrelenting "warfare" to achieve its goal of a free Palestine.

Irgun's action coincided with the verdict of a military court condemning a member of the Jewish underground organization to death for participating in an armed attack on a police station in which two police officers were killed last April 23.

The promise of continued strife was contained in a note transmitted to newspapers by Irgun leaders in reply to a message from U. S. Rep. Joseph Clark Baldwin (R-N.Y.), who was published last Saturday in the Palestine Post. Baldwin, administrative chairman of the political action committee for Palestine, asked Irgun to "halt operations in the holy land until I have acquainted the American government and people with your fight and the fight of Jewry at large."

Irgun thanked Baldwin for his "help in the campaign to free Palestine" but declared that "nothing must stop our fight."

(Dispatches from London yesterday reported increasing indications that official British opinion was inclining to the view that the only feasible way to settle the Palestine problem was to partition the holy land into separate Jewish and Arab states.)

Russell McCorkle, 56, Lineman For Railroad, Expires

Russell McCorkle, 56, of 1145 West Williams street, a telegraph and telephone lineman for the Illinois Central railroad for the past 23 years, was found dead about 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in the second floor wash room of the I. C. depot.

He apparently had succumbed to a heart attack. The railroad man's body was discovered by James L. Downs, assistant special agent of the I. C., and James C. Donahue, supervisor of track. They summoned Chief of Police Dan Bergan who went to the depot accompanied by Sgt. Harry Balk. A physician pronounced McCorkle dead and Deputy Coroner Louis J. Rivard was summoned.

Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon in the Herz Memorial temple with the Rev. Morgan Williams, pastor of the First Methodist church, officiating. Services will also be conducted by the Kankakee Masonic lodge. Burial will be in Mount Grove cemetery with the American Legion in charge.

Open Inquest

An inquest was opened at the court house this afternoon by Deputy Coroner Rivard.

Mr. McCorkle was born Aug. 16, 1890 at Knightstown, Ind., a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel T. McCorkle and grew to manhood in that community. He had resided in Kankakee for the last 30 years.

Wife, Daughters Survive

Surviving are his wife, the former Mrs. Beatrice Miller whom he married June 30, 1930 at South Bend, Ind.; a daughter, Mrs. Marie De Matto of Countryside, Ind.; four step-daughters, Mrs. Goldie Jackson, Mrs. Elmer Ravens and Mrs. Darlene Danca, all of Kankakee, and Mrs. Ethel Newton of Elmonte, Cal.; nine grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Ina Alexander of New Castle, Ind., and two brothers, Carl McCorkle of Chicago and George of Pasadena, Cal.

Mr. McCorkle was a member of Kankakee lodge 389, A. F. & M., the American Legion, the Electrical Workers union and was a veteran of World War I.

18 Hurt As Plane Hits Dwelling

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 2.—(AP)—Eighteen persons were injured last night when a DC-3 two-engine airplane, groping its way into Nashville's fog-bound airport, crashed into a dwelling.

Two occupants of the dwelling were hurt, and the 18 occupants of the plane, members of a vaudeville troupe, were injured.

Airport officials said they had been advised of the night when the plane took off from Richmond, Va., and said a safe landing here virtually was impossible because of fog. All regular airline flights had been cancelled.

Chinese Students Continue Demands To Oust Yanks

Nanking, Jan. 2.—(AP)—One thousand Chinese students today carried their demands for ouster of American servicemen from China to the U. S. embassy and Chiang Kai-Shek's headquarters.

They said they would march to the home of General Marshall, U. S. peace envoy to China, and to the Chinese foreign office tomorrow.

Chanting "Americans go home" and ignoring a ministry of education order banning such parades, the students carried petitions to Chiang's headquarters and the U. S. embassy.

The petitions demanded withdrawal of U. S. troops from China, and requested that the United Nations security council order U. S. troops moved, and that full details of the alleged rape of a Peiping girl by two U. S. marines be published.

U. S. Ambassador Stuart Butlerworth received the petitions' chairman and the petition. He gave the students Stuart's reply:

"U. S. marine authorities are proceeding with the case as rapidly as the demands of justice and a democratic trial will permit."

In Peiping, marine officials are preparing to put the charges before a court martial. They said however, the Chinese police have not cooperated in the investigation; that one leatherneck denies any relations with the girl and the other insisted he had relations with her on a professional basis.

Shanghai was relatively calm today after a vehement "quit China" anti-American demonstration yesterday by some 6,000 Chinese students.

Link Most Of Army Personnel In Europe To Black Market

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The house military committee today approved a staff report stating that a "vast majority" of American military personnel in Europe seem to be involved in one way or another in black market activities.

The original report was made public by a committee member several weeks ago.

The committee suggested that "it should be possible to check the bank accounts or income tax returns of various officers or enlisted men who were in Germany a year ago to ascertain the present state of their fortunes."

Boost Portal Pay Demands Above \$2 Billion

Detroit, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Portal pay suits asking a total of \$410,000,000 in claims and damages were filed today by the CIO United Auto Workers against the "big three" of the automobile industry in Michigan.

In addition, the union said, suits totaling \$32,210,000 are being filed against the Ford Motor Co. simultaneously outside of Michigan. With claims already on record this brings to \$490,000,000 the total asked by the union from Ford, General Motors Corp. and Chrysler Corp.

Labor Laws In Spotlight In New Congress

Republicans Dominate Session Scheduled To Begin Friday

Washington, Jan. 2.—(UPI)—Rep. Charles Halleck of Indiana today won the coveted post of house Republican leader in the new GOP-controlled congress which convenes tomorrow.

Democrats drafted outgoing Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas to be minority leader in the house.

Halleck got a clear field for the important majority post when his last two opponents withdrew in the interest of party harmony. They were Reps. Everett M. Dirksen, R., Ill., and Thomas A. Jenkins, R., O.

Jenkins announced his withdrawal a few hours after Dirksen pulled out of the race. A fourth contender, Rep. Clarence Brown, R., O., withdrew earlier this week.

Rep. Joseph Martin Jr., Mass., who has been the Republican leader, will succeed Rayburn as house speaker.

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Labor legislation held the spotlight today on the eve of a congressional session dominated by Republicans for the first time in 15 years.

Rep. Leo E. Allen, Illinois Republican slated to head the powerful house rules committee, predicted that a "large majority" of Democrats on both sides of Capitol Hill will support GOP-proposed labor legislation.

The Republicans were expected to hold back until President Truman outlines his views in his state-of-the-union message to a joint senate-house session next Monday.

However, party heads in the house which would prevent strikes in industries affecting the public health or welfare. Some of them advocate compulsory arbitration.

Schedule Caucuses

Both parties scheduled caucuses today to select candidates for organization of the senate and the house when they convene tomorrow. Most differences that had threatened to rupture harmonious intraparty relations already have been removed.

Select Sen. Taft

Senate Republicans already had agreed, except for the formality of caucus approval today, on Senator Taft of Ohio as steering committee chairman, Senator Vandenberg of Michigan as president pro tem, Senator White of Maine as majority leader, and Senator Wherry of Nebraska as majority whip.

Their Democratic colleagues agreed to designate Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky as minority floor leader.

Washington, Jan. 2.—(AP)—Senator Elbert Thomas (D-Utah), co-author of the law on which portal-to-portal pay suits are based, said today congress should keep hands off the

5-Inch Snow Increases Road Hazards Here

Charge 60 CIO Unions Violated Election Laws

Communist Party, 11 Corporations Named By Special House Group

Washington, Jan. 2.—(UPI)—A special house committee which investigated the November elections today accused 60 CIO unions, 11 corporations and the Communist party of violating the corrupt practices act.

It said it would ask the justice department to examine the matter. The campaign expenditures committee charged the unions and corporation with violating a section of the act prohibiting any corporation or union from making contributions in connection with any elections.

It charged the Communist party with violation of the act by failing to report its campaign expenditures to the clerk of the house as required by law.

Col. Robert C. Barker, chief committee investigator said all the unions have headquarters in New York.

List Unions

He said they included the National Maritime Union, American Communications Association, United Electrical Radio and Machine Workers, Amalgamated Clothing Workers, American Newspaper Guild, United Public Workers, Transport Workers Union and the Teachers Union of the United Public Workers.

Storm Bears Down On 150 Mile Wide Belt

Cancel Plane Flights; Traffic Snarled; New Cold Wave Due Soon

SPECIAL WARNING

Chicago, Jan. 2.—(AP)—The U. S. weather bureau today issued the following special warning for Illinois, Indiana and lower Michigan.

Heavy snow this afternoon and evening over a band about 150 miles wide from northeastern Illinois through northern Indiana and northwestern lower Michigan to northeastern lower Michigan. Total depths will range from six inches in western portion to 10 inches in eastern. Considerable drifting and blowing of snow. South of heavy rain in Illinois and Indiana there will be freezing rain this afternoon and evening changing to snow to night.

A swirling snowstorm bore down on a 150-mile-wide belt of the middle west today as rain, sleet, and snow blanketed most of the southern half of the nation.

Airplane flights were cancelled in many sections of the country because of the weather, and highway traffic was snarled by slippery pavements.

Sections of New Mexico, Texas, Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma were hit by heavy snow, and seven inches blanketed Abilene, Tex., early today.

Amario, Tex., saw four inches of snow, and there was a one-inch fall at Los Angeles, Calif.

Fair weather was limited principally to the northern Rocky mountain and Pacific states and the southern tip of the Florida peninsula.

Chicago, the nation's second city was blanketed with its heaviest snowfall of the season, which was expected to reach 10 inches by tomorrow. The weather bureau predicted heavy snows for an arc extending from northeastern Missouri through northern Illinois and northwestern Indiana and across lower Michigan.

All flights were cancelled out of Chicago municipal airport, and there were no incoming flights. Railroads and motor bus companies said they were meeting their schedules this morning and the Illinois highway department hoped to keep highways clear.

Railroads reported the snowstorm had caused delays only in the Chicago area this morning.

The Northwestern railroad said only its Chicago division was affected. There was rain as far as Jacksonville on its Jacksonville division, the road reported.

Buses Running

Motor bus terminals here said the storm had not yet affected their service. One line said a bus from the west coast arrived only 20 minutes late this morning, and it had cancelled no runs.

The Chicago district of the Illinois highway department has been using extra men and equipment for the past few days keeping the roads clear. The district engineer said all highways were open to two-way traffic, although packed snow and ice made driving difficult. The highway department said there was wet snow and rain in the southern two-thirds of the state, except in the extreme south portion.

As cold weather prevailed over the south, hundreds of visitors to the New Year's day Sugar Bowl football game were stranded in New Orleans as murky skies forced cancellation of scheduled airline flights.

Grid Fans Shiver





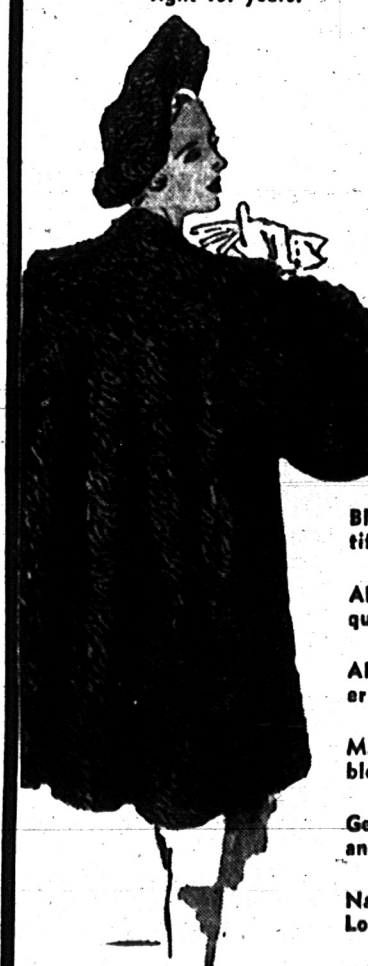

New Source Of Credit For Farm Owners Available

The inauguration of Farmers Home Administration on Nov. 1, 1946 has opened a new source of credit for farm owners interested in improving or developing their farms, according to Vincent L. Brandow, FSA supervisor for Cook, DuPage, Kankakee and Will counties.

In addition to loans for the acquisition of family type farms provided under the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant act, loans are now authorized for the enlargement of under-sized farm units and for the improvement and repair of family type farms. Refinancing existing indebtedness on farms in connection with enlargement or improvement loans is also authorized.

Improvement Loans
Improvement loans may be used for limestone, phosphate, terracing, drainage, fencing, and other recognized land improvement practices. Funds may also be used to construct new buildings essential to efficient farm operation, and the remodeling or repair of existing farm structures.

Such loans bear interest at the rate of 3½ per cent per annum amortized over a 40 year period making an annual fixed installment of \$46.83 on each \$1,000 loaned.

Further information concerning these loans may be secured from Mr. Brandow, FSA supervisor, whose office is located at 409 D'Arcy building, 81 North Chicago street, Joliet.

Mr. Brandow is at the AAA office in the Farm Bureau building in Kankakee every Wednesday morning from 10 o'clock to noon.
