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# Grand Jury Steps On Gambling

## Rep. Case Offers New Labor Bill

### Bans Strikes That Endanger Public Welfare

Set January 20 As  
Deadline To Begin  
Labor Hearings

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Rep. James C. McHenry (R-S.D.) today introduced legislation authorizing the government to enjoin labor unions from strikes that endanger the public welfare and making workers as well as employers liable to unfair labor charges.

Case, author of a labor bill that passed Congress last year only to be vetoed by President Truman, said his new measure is intended to let labor and management live together in peace.

In a statement he said he does not consider his measure "the bill" but a bill which he hopes will afford "an opportunity to meet our responsibilities in a comprehensive way."

Cases new bill expands in some respects on the one which failed last year. In other aspects it goes beyond the top senate bill introduced by Senators Baile (R-Minn.), Taft (R-Ohio), and A. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.).

Fresh from a conference with CIO leaders, Senator James Murray (D-Mont.) said today that if Congress passes "drastic labor legislation" it will create "serious bitterness and conflict."

On the other hand, he said, if no "restrictive, penalizing legislation" is enacted:

"...that labor and management can get together and work out their differences without a serious war of attrition."

Set Deadline  
Senate and house leaders today set January 20 as the "outside" date to start hearings on proposed labor laws.

The labor committee of one of the other chamber may go into action before then. But there is a chance they may launch together a week from Monday—one of the biggest double features billed on Capitol Hill in many a year.

The idea at both ends of the capitol is the same—to turn out some kind of a bill that will tighten the screws a bit on labor unions and discourage strikes that paralyze business.

Dozens of labor bills already have been introduced by individual lawmakers. Rep. Hoffman (R-Mich.), a labor committee member, has introduced another on top for tomorrow.

Closed Shop  
In the senate, Senator Baile (R-Minn.) put forward a new measure which would close the shop. It would make illegal all provisions in any contract or future contract requiring a person to be a union member to get or hold a job.

But Senate hearings probably will center first on a bill which Baile helped write, along with Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) of the labor committee and Senator H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.). An expanded version of the old Case bill, it is the senate's top labor measure.

Major provisions of the Baile-Smith bill would:

Make it easier to sue unions for violations of contracts, outlaw jurisdictional and organizational strikes, require unions to register and file financial statements with the labor department, deny collective bargaining powers to supervisory employees, create a new federal mediation board to solve disputes during a 60-day cooling off period.

Peruvian  
Cabinet  
Resigns

Lima, Jan. 9.—(UP)—The entire Peruvian cabinet resigned today as a result of the alleged political murder of one of Peru's most prominent publishers.

The mass resignation of President Jose Luis Bustamante Rivero's ministers came after an unidentified gunman shot down Francisco Grana Garland, publisher of the morning newspaper La Prensa, on Tuesday evening.

Political quarters said that Bustamante would be forced to accept the resignations and declared that the shooting provoked a political crisis that placed the government in serious difficulties.

La Prensa said, "we are dealing with a crime clearly, and unmistakably of political origin."

In Mexico City, Dr. Ricardo Alcala Mongrut, La Prensa's assistant publisher, told the United Press that Grana had been the leader in a fight to keep the Peruvian government from granting Canada's International Petroleum company vast oil concessions.

## Senate Bill Junks All Rent Controls

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—President Truman's appeal for extension of rent control beyond June 30 collided in the senate today with a bill to junk the whole program February 1.

Democratic Senator O'Daniel of Texas sponsored the legislation to eliminate controls and Republicans Wherry (Nebr.), Moore (Okla.) and Bushfield (S.D.), lined up in support of his proposal. Several other senators said controls should continue but that landlords should be permitted to increase rents as much as 15 per cent.

Spurred by a decision of the Office of Temporary Controls to eliminate ceilings on transient rooms Feb. 15, organized real estate representatives renewed their demands that rentals of houses and apartments also be freed.

"There is not a single reason for motor courts and hotels to get decontrol that doesn't apply to apartment owners," Herbert U. Nelson, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, declared in an interview.

In urging the scrapping of rent controls, O'Daniel recalled that he had demanded the end of all OPA restrictions last June.

"After the November election the New Dealers finally saw the handwriting on the wall and got rid of most controls," he said.

"I think it's time now, if we want to follow the constitution, to throw all of them out and turn the government back to the people."

Senator Caperhart (R-Ind.) said he favors an increase of "up to 15 per cent" and Senator Flanders (R-Vt.) urged a boost of "say five per cent every six months starting now" until "economic conditions" start rents on the down trend.

Hopes Rise For  
Strikeless Steel  
Settlement

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Government hopes rose today for a strikeless settlement of the steel wage dispute.

The optimism was based partly on a prediction by the authoritative magazine Steel that the industry and the CIO United Steelworkers may reach accord this year without a strike.

In addition, it was counted significant that wage demands in the oil, meat packing and rubber industries are now being settled without strikes. As in steel, CIO unions play a leading role in those industries, all of which had actual or threatened stoppages last year.

Settlements reached thus far range from seven to 18 cents an hour. Some quarters expected the steel settlement to fall within that pattern.

The steel workers union and U. S. Steel Corp., belwether of the industry, begin negotiations in Pittsburgh a week from today. Both sides hope to reach a settlement without coming to Washington.

Both are prepared with extensive studies on the guaranteed annual wage, one of the union's principal demands. The union will also bring in a report on the steel industry's profits now being prepared by Robert R. Nathan. Nathan made the analysis for the CIO which claimed that industry generally could grant a 15 per cent wage increase now without raising prices.

The union will file 30-day strike notices against more than 40 principal steel companies next week to fulfill its obligation under the war labor disputes act. One official said he hoped the union would not have to make the notice effective.

Expecting Baby,  
Girl Asks Speed  
In Murder Trial

Baltimore, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A 21-year-old expectant mother, charged with murdering her soldier husband, asked U. S. Commissioner James K. Cullen yesterday for a speedy trial, to be completed before the birth of her baby.

Margaret Mildred Abney, Conshohocken, Pa., brunette, entered an innocent plea at her arraignment. She was arrested at Fort George G. Meade Sunday night after Military Police Sergeant Jean Richard Abney, 28, of Junction City, Kas., was found dead of gunshot wounds in the back and legs.

Cpl. W. R. May of Maryland state police quoted her husband's insistence that she return to Conshohocken.

Men Who Know  
Food Prices To Drop, Brokers  
On Commodity Exchanges Say

Chicago, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The men who are among the best informed about food prices, the brokers on the country's commodity exchange markets, think prices will go lower.

Many new year predictions have been made recently by banks, economists and businessmen concerning future prices. But the forecasts on exchanges are the composite opinions of brokers dealing in the commodities.

Butter prices are high, but you can buy some butter today on the Chicago mercantile exchange for delivery in June at about 53 cents a pound. That's around 22 cents under present wholesale prices.

For the average person who just wants some butter to spread on bread that wouldn't be practical—would have to take 12,000 pounds, which is the amount represented by a "futures" contract. To save yourself from being drowned in butter you'd better sell before delivery day.

Significance of that 53 cent price, however, is that it is today's best guess of the butter and egg men on what the wholesale price will be this summer.

In nearly all markets in which food is traded for future delivery, a similar trend is shown. Eggs are a single exception. In most cases, the more distant the delivery, the lower the price.

Take wheat, which is basic for flour, bread, macaroni and other foods. The cash price at Chicago is around \$2.20 a bushel. If you buy for March delivery, it is \$2.04. For July it is \$1.79, or 40 cents under present cash prices. Other grains follow that pattern.

Santos coffee will cost 26 cents a pound for delivery in January but only 23 cents for next December. Cocoa is 25 cents for March and 23 cents for September.

This trend holds true for commodities other than foods. Cash cotton is about 33 cents a pound. So is the March delivery. But cotton for delivery in March, 1948, is under 27 cents.

Employees of the Allis-Chalmers farm equipment plant, strike-bound for eight months, will vote within the next few weeks in an election which could throw out the CIO Auto Workers Union as bargaining agent.

In a decision which may have wide implications, Federal Judge F. Ryan Duffy ruled yesterday that the Wisconsin employment relations board acted within its jurisdiction in ordering a new bargaining election at the plant.

Duffy denied a petition by Local 248, UAW-CIO, to restrain the board from holding the election, contending that the union had not shown that an election would result in "immediate or irreparable injury to the UAW."

The union had challenged the state board's authority to order the election and hoped to obtain an injunction to prevent it.

Immediately after the court's ruling, John E. Fitzgibbon, industrial member of the three-man state labor board, said that workers hired since the strike began would not be eligible to vote. He said the election probably would be held Jan. 19 or 26.

## Orders All Games Of Chance Stopped In Kankakee County

Directive Covers Everything From Bookies To Bingo, Including Games Played In Private Clubs And Halls

A sweeping order to clear Kankakee county of all forms of gambling—from bookies to bingo—was issued yesterday by the grand jury to Sheriff Gene LaFontaine and Chief of Police Dan Bergan.

The order climaxed a two-day session during which the jurors voted indictments against seven persons and one no-bill, according to a partial report submitted to Judge C. D. Henry.

Both Sheriff LaFontaine and Chief Bergan said this morning that they would comply 100 per cent with the directive immediately.

It is reported that the grand jury's order emphasized all forms of gambling—including pinball games, slot machines, racing handbooks, card games, punchboards, bingo games, lotteries and other types. These are banned in private clubs and halls as well as in taverns, night clubs and other public places.

See Revenue Cut  
Authorities stated today that the grand jury's action automatically illegalizes the city of Kankakee's pinball and punch board ordinances under which the municipality has realized a revenue totaling \$13,000 annually. All but \$1,500 of this amount comes from licenses paid for approximately 150 pinball machines—\$7,500 from the places of business in which the machines are located and \$1,000 each from each of the four owners of the devices. Six punchboard operators paid \$250 each for licenses for the city's present fiscal year, which ends April 30.

After calling in the heads of the two-law enforcing agencies, the grand jury adjourned until Jan. 20 when LaFontaine and Bergan will be recalled to report on the extent to which they have carried out the no-gambling ultimatum.

Vote One No-Bill  
The no-bill vote by the jury was in the case of Robert Barnes, 17-year-old Brooklyn magazine salesman, who had been a prisoner in the county jail since Nov. 9 on a charge of assault with intent to rape. State's Attorney Joseph Tolson said the woman Barnes is alleged to have assaulted in a Waukegan home the same day he was arrested refused to testify against the youth. The salesman originally gave his age as 21. He was released from custody by Sheriff LaFontaine immediately after the grand jury's decision in the case.

Another sex charge was modified by the jurors when an indictment charging Fabian William Dudley, 21, a Chanute field soldier, with contributing to the delinquency of a minor instead of rape was voted. Dudley had been accused by a 17-year-old Kankakee waitress of having raped her Dec. 6 on a Kankakee street while walking her to a friend's house from a tavern. The jury certified the soldier to the County court for trial. Dudley is a prisoner in the county jail.

One person indicted for larceny by the grand jury immediately went into Circuit court yesterday afternoon, was arraigned and pleaded guilty. He is James Walker, 17-year-old Kankakee, who was accused in four counts of having stolen \$160 from the room of Chester McNash. After entering his guilty plea, Walker asked for probation. Judge Henry referred the motion to Adult Probation Officer Rebecca Dubois for investigation. She is to report on the merits of the request on or before Jan. 22. Walker has been free under \$1,500 bond.

Six for Larceny  
Six indictments each for burglary and larceny were voted against John and Vivian Meyers, middle-aged Kankakee couple, who are in custody of Iroquois county authorities after their arrest here in November. They are reported to have confessed to a series of farm burglaries. The six true bills accused them of burglarizing the farm homes of Leonard Schultz, William Jacobs, Walter Hatch, Victor Fraser, George Dittus and Owen Heiler, all during the period Oct. 27 to Nov. 22.

Since the Meyerses are awaiting grand jury action in Iroquois county it is questionable whether they will stand trial in this county. If they are in custody, the couple, for similar crimes there, it is unlikely that the pair will ever be prosecuted here. State's Attorney Joseph Tolson said. Bail for each was set by Judge Henry at \$1,500.

The other three alleged felons indicted were not identified by Tolson because it is not known whether they are in custody.

Before adjourning temporarily, the jurors made their regular inspection of the county jail and found it unnecessary to recommend improvements.

Riots Break Out  
In Bombay; 50 Hurt

Bombay, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Riotous clashes broke out today between Hindus and the scheduled castes (untouchables), causing casualties estimated to total 50.

Police announced an all night curfew for the affected northern area of Bombay. The night outbreaks complicated the serious communal troubles between Hindus and Moslems.

Officers fired repeatedly to break up fights, principally by workers. Tension was acute as darkness approached.

The fighting apparently resulted from the stabbings yesterday of a Hindu and a leader of the scheduled castes federation.

Bandits Rout 12 From Chicago  
Rooming House, Rob Two Safes

Chicago, Jan. 9.—(AP)—A gang of bandits, carrying revolvers and shotguns, routed 12 persons from a three-story west side rooming house last night and while several gunmen held them prisoner for nearly two hours their companions broke open two safes owned by John McKenzie, the landlord. Money and other possessions of the roomers were ignored by the gunmen.

McKenzie, 64, was not at home at the time, but early today he told Des Plaines police he had \$11,000 jewelry and "lots of mortgages" in the safe. Police said McKenzie had lived in the old mansion all his life and owned considerable property on the west side.

The roomers herded from their apartments by the bandits included four women, one an invalid, a 13-year-old boy, and seven men. The robbers, believed to number from six to eight, tied the men's hands with rope after forcing them into a basement room. They carried Mrs. Ernest Beggs, 51, an invalid,

from her second floor room to the first floor, and also allowed Mrs. Betty Ann Teel, 19, an expectant mother, to return to her second-floor room from the basement.

While two robbers remained on guard in the basement, others broke into McKenzie's first floor room and drilled open the two safes and escaped with the contents.

The roomers in the basement said the bandits told them, "Listen, if you had \$1,000 on you, we wouldn't touch it. We're after that stuff upstairs."

## Republicans Stand Pat On Tax Cut Plans

Rep. Taber, Sen. Taft Differ On Funds For National Defense

Washington, Jan. 9.—(UP)—House Republicans stood pat on their tax reduction plans today despite renewed opposition from President Truman.

They said both personal income taxes and excise levies could and would be cut even though the President felt such moves represented "unsound fiscal policy."

The President called for maintenance of current tax levels in his state of the union message to Congress on Monday, in his economic report yesterday, and will certainly do it again in his budget message.

Washington, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Congressional Republicans differ today over national defense costs.

Rep. Taber (NY) is demanding that army-navy outlays be cut drastically while Senator Taft (Ohio) is counseling against such a course.

Taber, who heads the new house appropriations committee, told a reporter he is convinced the military services can get along with \$8,000,000,000 between them in the budget year beginning next July 1.

Furthermore, he said that if President Truman recommends a larger amount in the budget message to Congress tomorrow, steps will be taken to trim the proposed expenditures.

Taber, chairman of the senate GOP steering committee, told a newspaperman he thinks Senate Republicans want to find budget reductions elsewhere and not make them at the expense of national defense.

Effect Savings  
Senator Bridges (R-N.Y.), who heads the senate appropriations committee, shares this overall view. However, he and others will insist that savings be effected where military purchasing, intelligence and similar operations can be combined.

Bridges said he thinks a number of army camps, now being maintained in this country with skeleton staffs, could be closed and some reductions made that way.

Taber contended that about \$2,500,000,000 can be looped off military expenditures for items and services that were necessary in the past, but no longer needed.

If President Truman fixes total federal spending at about \$37,000,000,000 as generally forecast, Taft said it seemed likely that from \$10,000,000,000 to \$12,000,000,000 of this amount would be for the army and navy.

Find Places To Cut  
He said that while Senate Republicans would favor paring the larger amount, he doubted if they would wish to challenge the smaller, except where it was apparent that savings could be made without impairing military efficiency.

He has no doubt, Taft continued, that Republicans can find places to cut off at least \$3,500,000,000 from a \$37,000,000,000 budget without any drastic defense reductions.

Plan Florida  
To Washington  
Drone Flight

Washington, Jan. 9.—(UP)—A radio-controlled army bomber will fly between Florida and Washington next Monday to demonstrate a probable bombing technique in any future war, it was announced today.

The army air forces said the flight would take the "drone" plane and its accompanying control ship from Eglin Field, Fla., to Washington and return.

The AAF said the flight was to show how a bombing mission could be carried out against an easily-defended area without risking the lives of human pilots.

Both the drone and the "mother" plane from which it will be controlled are B-17 Flying Fortress. A pilot in the mother ship will follow the drone's flight on a screen similar to that used in television. He will control its movements by radio.

On the way northward, after reaching Richmond, Va., the drone will head out to sea where a bomb will be released by the radio control device. It then will fly to Washington and circle the city before returning to Eglin Field.

In the Bikini atomic bomb tests, drones flew through radioactive clouds after the bombs had exploded, carrying instruments to record scientific data.

Capt. Walter Schlie, Decatur, Ill., will be the navigator aboard the mother plane.

The mother and five babies were reported doing well.



## Rapid Means Of Detecting Polio Sought

San Francisco, Jan. 9.—(UPI)—A rapid but accurate means of detecting infected persons in an epidemic community must be found if control of infantile paralysis is to be achieved.

With such a "laboratory tool" scientists could make an on-the-spot survey of a stricken area. This would determine who in the community previously had poliovirus as well as those persons recently infected. Scientists for years have been striving to find this laboratory tool, such as a blood test, but have been baffled in their efforts.

Pioneers in this search are experts at the Hooper foundation of the University of California. These scientists, with the aid of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, are now experimenting with the possibility of attaching the tiny polio virus to a larger substance such as a protein to make a blood test.

Earlier experiments were made by attempting to place a coating of virus over dead bacteria. This was done in the hope of increasing the mass of virus so that its reaction with human blood would be seen. The virus and the dead bacteria, however, did not attract each other be-

**Pay Raise Averts Chicago School Strike**

Chicago, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The Men's Teachers club, an unaffiliated organization of 850 Chicago high school teachers, has postponed a strike, originally set for today, as the result of wage bonds granted by the board of education.

The board granted increases of \$35 a month for elementary teachers and \$25 a month for high school teachers.

Herbert N. Scott, president of the club, said members of the recently organized group voted last night to call off the strike for two months, "to see what the board of education would do through the legislature and other means to get funds."

Maximum high school salaries prior to the latest increase had been \$2,000 annually. The teachers club had asked a 30 per cent increase.

Scott said the \$25 increase "does not measure up to our demands and the board program will have to be revised upward some \$400 a year."

**Income Tax Is Rotary Club Topic**

A subject that is quite familiar to the United States' rotating men—the income tax and all its confusing angles—was the topic for discussion at the weekly meeting of the Rotary club yesterday as Philip Sweet, deputy collector of internal revenue in the Kankakee area, staged a panel discussion for the club members.

Mr. Sweet told the men that the last federal income tax was passed in 1931 and that new ones were adopted in 1932, 1933 and 1934. The basis for the present income tax laws was set up in 1933. The local revenue office not only deals with income taxes, but also with scores of other federal taxes, the deputy collector pointed out.

"The 'Horse Sense' of the law doesn't cover everything," the deputy collector remarked. "In such cases all we can do is put into practice some 200 common horse sense."



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# Railroader Sticks To His Switch, Dies

Griffith, Ind., Jan. 8. (UP)—Joseph Miller, 53, lost his life because he remained true to a railroad man's traditions and stuck by his switch.

When fire broke out in the automatic control tower which was burning, Miller climbed down the long, 30 foot steel ladder and gunned the engine. When help arrived, smoke was rolling from the windows high above the track intersection for five miles, and roads, and blue flames crackled along the high-power transmission lines leading into the tiny shack atop the tower.

When told Miller the smoke was too dense for him to enter the control booth, but the switch-tender insisted he was the only person who knew how to shut off the automatic controls and turn them over to manual operation.

Miller climbed the hot rungs through clouds of smoke, entered his "office" and cut the switches. While firemen battled the flames with chemicals, Miller began the trip down the ladder. A few feet from the bottom he stumbled and fell unconscious to the ground.

His wife and daughter found him there, a pulmotor sound unsuccessfully trying to restore his life. A physician told them he died of hemorrhage induced by the smoke.

## 252 Colleges Agree To NCAA 'Purity Code'

New York, Jan. 9.—The 252 member colleges of the National Collegiate Athletic Association were under moral obligation today to abide by the growing list of "purity code" and to start cleaning their athletic houses immediately.

Actually, the set of five principles governing the conduct of intercollegiate athletics which were approved at the concluding session of the NCAA yesterday, do not go into effect until the next annual meeting in 1948.

Between now and then, the code with its implementation clause, providing sanctions against non-compliance, will be written into the constitution by a committee appointed for that purpose.

"This will give the colleges a year of grace to get cleaned up and adjust their conference rules, where necessary, to conform to the new code," explained Prof. Karl E. Leib, Iowa's athletic chairman.

Also referred to was a constitutional revision committee was a resolution offered by Col. William Couper of Virginia, which would limit the number of varsity sports to three and prohibit participation in post-season games.

Couper's anti-bowl proposal and the anti-recruiting provisions of the purity code will meet vigorous opposition on the convention floor. The other code provisions, including one limiting financial aid to athletes, were adopted by unanimous vote.

The southern colleges and particularly the Southeastern conference, which admits to having its athletes through open "subsidization" with the money of the convention in approving all the principles except the recruiting clause.

Most southern colleges and a few others, including Princeton, declared that the recruiting paragraph was poorly worded and not practical under certain sectional conditions.

Delegates from the south and southwest maintained that recruiting would be continued with alumni in charge and that it would give advantages to colleges with strong alumni organizations.

The principle finally was adopted, 66 to 25 in the all-day showdown voting. Some colleges, notably Notre Dame, abstained from voting.

**Table Bowl, Abstention**  
The decision to table the anti-bowl resolution and then refer it to the committee, came after a lengthy discussion during which it was pointed out that the long-established bowl games have been an accepted part of the collegiate program.

The convention unanimously approved the resolution, derived from a round-table discussion yesterday, calling for a "clean sports" action plan for the naming of a committee and puts the NCAA on record as agreeing to consider the organization of a "clean sports" federation. It calls for stronger enforcement and suggests that newspapers refrain from printing names of probable winners and that coaches and athletic directors be forbidden from making predictions.

Last night's three park district city league basketball games in the annual number of thrills. Especially exciting was the double overtime contest in which Florence Stovemen, five defeated the North Side A.C. 39 to 37.

In the other games, the invulnerable Gaithersham Businessmen made a convincing showing against the Swannell Eagles before surrendering 48 to 42, and Bradley's Lunettes, league-leading Argos, defeated the Luth & Cooley Clothiers, 64 to 46.

The surprising Gallagher team hit six buckets in their first seven shots, and tied Swannell 19-17 at the end of the first quarter. In the second quarter they led at one time 23-7. Then the Eagles started to click and tied the score 27-27 at the half. At the end of the third quarter the Bulldogs led 39 to 33. Gallagher started hitting again in the fourth quarter and led the Eagles by one point with three minutes to go. Swannell went in to win, 48 to 42.
