### U. S. Reds Go On Trial

#### 400 Police Guard Court In New York

##### Communists Charge Effort Made To Intimidate Jury Panel

New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Trial of a dozen high Communist leaders opened today amid defense counsel charges that a large police detail assigned to the trial was "a deliberate, purposeful effort to poison the minds of the prospective jurors."

The accusation came after one of the largest court guards in New York police history was stationed in and about the federal courtroom to maintain order.

The communist defendants are charged with working for the forcible overthrow of the U. S. government.

At the outset, Federal Judge Harold R. Medina overruled a defense motion that city police be removed from the court house and its vicinity.

After arguing that the 400-man police detail was an attempt by the prosecution to intimidate the jury panel, George W. Crockett Jr., Negro defense attorney from San Francisco, said a "rough count" disclosed there were more police than spectators in the square outside the court house.

##### Foster Absent

Only 11 of the defendants were present. Missing was William Z. Foster, national chairman of the Communist party, whose attorneys previously had indicated he would not attend the trial.

Sealed medical reports on the condition of Communist national chairman William Z. Foster will decide the question of a possible delay in the trial.

The trial was postponed last November because Foster, 67, was suffering a heart ailment.

Hear Doctors' Reports

U. S. District Judge Harold R. Medina will open the sealed reports filed by two doctors last Wednesday, stating whether Foster is in physical condition to stand the trial, which is expected to last at least two months.

The two court-appointed physicians' findings are same as last November, U. S. Attorney John F. X. McGonhey is expected to move for a separate trial later for Foster and for immediate start of the trial of the other eleven.

Defense attorneys are expected to contend that Foster is a vital defense witness and that trial of the co-defendants cannot proceed without him.

##### Face Prison, Fine

The defendants who compose the national board of the Communist party face a possible maximum penalty of ten years in prison and \$10,000 fine if convicted.

#### Motorist Impaled On Guard Rail, Lives

St. Louis, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Clarence J. Schmal, 25, was impaled on a ten-foot section of guard rail for about 45 minutes yesterday, and survived.

The Kroger company auditor lost control of his automobile on the express highway opposite the arena, and the vehicle tore through the guard rail.

A 14-inch pipe at the top of the guard rail went through the hood of the car, came out the dashboard, pierced Schmal's abdomen and the car seat behind him.

Firemen sawed off the pipe on each side of Schmal's body and physicians at City hospital later removed the portion of pipe which had been left in his body. Schmal was conscious until he reached the hospital.

His condition was described today as critical. Physicians said he suffered ruptures of a kidney and the intestine.

#### 3 Persons Hurt In Six Week-End Auto Accidents

##### Railroad Locomotive Strikes Taxicab At Harrison Ave. Crossing

Three persons, one a pedestrian, were injured in six week-end vehicle collisions within the city, police reports disclosed this morning. Two remain in St. Mary hospital today.

Sam Regas, 22, of 425 South Third avenue, a Checker cab driver, sustained a cut over the right eye and possible chest injuries when the taxi he was driving was struck by a freight train at the Erie Four railroad, about 10:15 p. m. Saturday.

The cab, which contained no passengers, was being driven north, while the train was traveling east. Ed Fortin was the engineer and C. D. Greenleaf the conductor. The taxi was reportedly carried about a half block along the tracks. Regas was taken to St. Mary hospital in a squad car by Policemen Richard Wischnowski and Lawrence Freigo. He remains in the infirmary today.

##### Pedestrian Struck

A pedestrian is reported in good condition in St. Mary hospital today, after incurring to police brain concussion and multiple bruises, when he was struck by an auto, in the 100 block on West Court street, about 2 a. m. yesterday.

He is Fred B. Lewis, 52, of 328 West Williams street. Lewis was knocked to the pavement by the car, operated by Virgil Marlaire, 25, of 235 North Grand avenue, Bradley.

According to police reports, Marlaire's car was being driven west and Lewis was walking from the south side of the street to the north. Lewis was taken to the hospital in the Glancy ambulance.

James M. Neuby, 65, of 469 South Wildwood avenue, was injured Friday night when the car in which he was a passenger, driven by Ed Surber, 53, of 255 1/2 West Mulberry street, collided with another, at the intersection of East avenue and Station street.

Surber reportedly made a left turn in his auto, from Station street onto East avenue, apparently in the path of a car driven by R. H. Just, 35, of 695 Frazer avenue.

Neuby was treated in St. Mary hospital for a cut on the head and released.

#### Fire Destroys Young Home In Aroma Park

##### Family Nearly Trapped In Blazing Building

An Aroma Park family lost its home and furnishings yesterday morning and missed possible death by only seconds as fire swept through the home leaving in its wake almost complete destruction.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Young and their two boys, Kenneth, 16, and John, 11, were routed from their sleep by the 6 a. m. fire and little more than a minute or two after they made their escape the residence was a roaring furnace.

Mrs. Young, who is employed by the Lowe Seed company, does the family washing each Sunday morning. At 5:30 a. m. yesterday she arose and lighted the kerosene stove in the pantry in order to heat water for washing. She lighted five burners on the stove, put the water on and then decided to lie down for a while. Before lying down, however, she turned the burners down slightly.

Mr. Young awakened at 6 and 6:15 o'clock. Mr. Young, an employee of the Triangle Construction company, explained, "I smelled fumes and not knowing that my wife had started the kerosene stove I thought perhaps something had gone wrong with our oil burner."

"The fumes were terrific and as I got near the pantry I saw a small ball of fire that looked about the size of a head. I figured then the kerosene stove was the cause and I shouted at my wife and two boys to get out of the house."

Kenneth's room was near the pantry and a door leading from the bedroom opened near the pantry. When I shouted and they didn't make a move, I knew he was unconscious. I pulled him out of bed and started rolling him about the floor and slapping his face. Finally he 'came to' and we all started to get to the front door to get out of the house. By this time the fumes had me pretty groggy so I had to get down on the floor and crawl."

"As I opened the front door there was a big explosion. That's when my wife and Kenneth got their hair singed. The four of us, all in our night clothing with the exception of John who had been able to slip on a pair of pants, had been outside only a few seconds when the entire house was ablaze."

Mr. Young assumed that when his wife turned down the burners on the kerosene stove she might have turned them down so low that the fire couldn't handle the amount of fuel being fed.

Firemen Do Good Job

The Aroma Park fire department was summoned and was able to extinguish the blaze before the structure was burned to the ground. The building was gutted, however, and all of the furnishings destroyed.

When the firemen reached the scene, the rapid blaze was already out of control.

The building was an old Aroma Park landmark and was located near the river in Riggs grove. Owner of the building was Trevlin Riggs.

The structure was reportedly built in the 1870s by a group of Cincinnati, Ohio, men who used the building for quarters when they hunted and fished in the area. The building at that time was known as the Cincinnati club. Before being remodeled it was on the order of a ranch house with

Democratic leaders from the Senate and the House conferred with President Truman. Barkley said they had a general discussion of the legislative program but reached no decisions as to what bill will be taken up first.

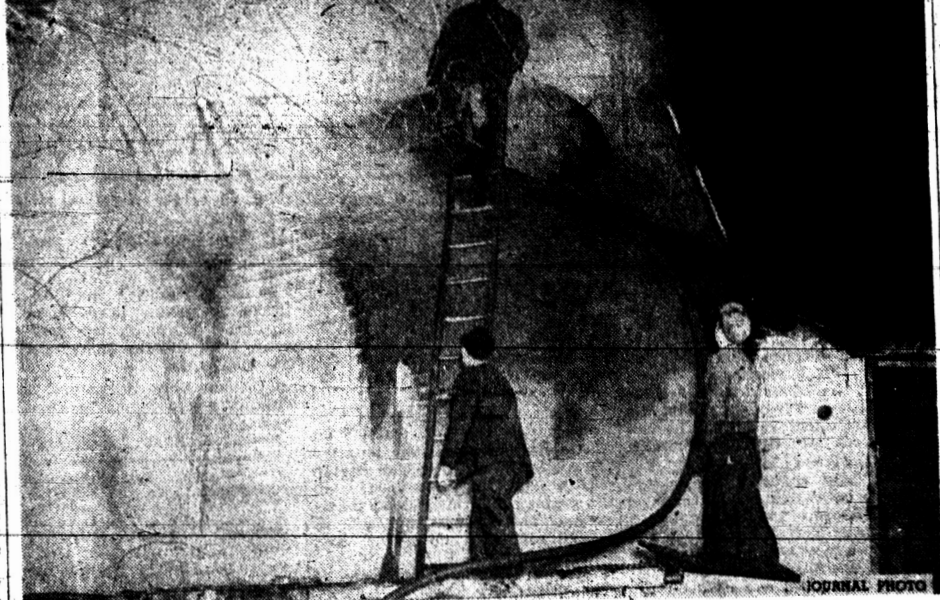

#### Congress Votes Raise In Pay For Truman

##### Boosts Salary To \$100,000; Hike Expense Allowance To \$90,000

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Congress today gave President Truman a pay boost from \$75,000 to \$100,000 a year and raised his tax-free expense allowance from \$40,000 to \$90,000.

By voice vote, the House completed action on the pay hike measure which already won Senate approval by a vote of 69 to 9.

The bill now goes to the White House for Mr. Truman's signature.

It also raises the salaries of the vice president and a speaker of the House from \$20,000 to \$30,000 a year and gives them \$10,000 each in tax-free expense allowances.

In other actions today: Senator Connally (D-Tex.) said he will present the President's nomination of Dean Acheson as secretary of state to the Senate tomorrow. Confirmation is almost certain.

#### Former Pilot Pleads Guilty To Treason

##### New York, Jan. 17.—(AP)—A 27-year-old former air force lieutenant pleaded guilty today to treason charges and was sentenced to 25 years imprisonment.

The ex-soldier, Martin Monti, also was fined \$10,000. He could have been sentenced to death on the charges.

The Florissant, Mo., resident was indicted last Oct. 14 on charges he gave himself and his plane up to the Germans in Italy between Oct. 13, 1944 and May 8, 1946 after going AWOL in Karachi, India.

The indictment alleged Monti volunteered his services to the Germans, was released as a prisoner of war and broadcast for the Nazis from Berlin as Martin Weithaupt. Subsequently, the indictment charges, Monti became an officer in the S. S. elite guard.

After the Nazi capitulation, it was charged, Monti made his way to Italy and joined the American fifth army.

Some 140 witnesses had been called before Federal Judge Robert A. Inch at the start of trial today. Several witnesses from Germany were present in the court to testify for the government.

Before the trial could get underway, however, Monti offered to plead guilty to the charges.

To date 24 persons have been indicted for treason, half of them for broadcasting anti-American propaganda. Fourteen persons have been convicted, two have died in Germany and the cases against three have been dropped.

The only death sentence among the convictions, however, has been issued against Tomonoye Kawakita, who established a wartime factory in Tokyo and mistreated American prisoners working there.

In the northwest, a voluntary around-the-clock brown-out appeal was made to electricity users, as frozen streams cut power output.

(At Salt Lake City, regional supervisor Hugh M. Bryan of the federal land management bureau warned that 1,000,000 sheep were imperiled because deep snow prevented truckloads of feed from reaching them, the United Press reported.)

He charged that rotary snowplows that could have broken through to the sheep during the weekend were used instead to keep roads open to mountain ski resorts.

(Some of the sheep already have died of starvation and 800,000 more are "in immediate peril," he said.)

35 Below Zero

The cold wave, spreading east and south from the upper plains and Rockies, shoved temperatures generally 10 to 20 degrees below normal mid-January levels from the Pacific coast to the midwest.

Fraser, Colo., reported 5 degrees below zero this morning. Big Piney, Wyo., had 34 below. And it was 27 below at Grand Forks, N. D. In Phoenix, Ariz., the low today was 22 degrees above zero.

Highway 66, which was closed last night by ice and snow between Winslow and Flagstaff, Ariz., was open today, but hazardous, and the state police patrol said its use is not advisable. Highway 80 was still closed from the Arizona border to Lordsburg. Many travelers chafed at Lordsburg by foot after abandoning their cars.

Snowfalls ranging from 12 inches at Duncan, Ariz., to 19 inches at Morenci had closed U. S. Highway 66 and other roads further south.

A Southern Pacific official said that the rail train had picked up 2 stranded motorists in less than

#### B-29 Smashes Into Mountain In Scotland

##### Service Men Were Enroute To U. S. For Furloughs

Glasgow, Jan. 17.—(UP)—Twenty U. S. service men, some of them bound for home on furlough, were killed when a Superfortress crashed and burned today on a barren mountainside in western Scotland.

The U. S. air force confirmed the death toll of all aboard tonight, nearly 12 hours after the big B-29 bomber smashed through a chimney for into the jaggedly-shriven mountains.

The identity of the victims will be withheld until their next of kin has been notified, as is the custom with service casualties.

The bodies and flame-scarred wreckage of the bomber were scattered over a broad reach of the 3,000-foot mountainside at Suesoth Glen, near Lochgilblhead.

Rescue teams said they could not determine yet whether any bodies still were in the smoking wreckage, but they found no signs of survivors.

##### On Way To U. S.

The plane was en route to Iceland on the first leg of a trip to the United States. At least some of the men aboard apparently were en route to furloughs at home.

Flying with a sister ship, the plane encountered heavy mist and fog over Scotland. A plane was heard circling before the crash, which occurred at about 10 a. m. (5 a. m. est), some two hours after the Super-Forces had left Scampton.

The sister ship turned back to Scampton and landed safely.

A B-29 carries a normal crew of 11, but can accommodate as many as 22. Air force personnel going on home leave to the United States frequently fly aboard such planes.

#### Can Cut Budget \$3 Billion, Says Taft

Washington, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said today that President Truman's \$41,900,000,000 budget can be cut by at least \$3,000,000,000 "if the Hoover reorganization plan is adopted."

Taft told a reporter he is convinced the proposed spending program for the fiscal year beginning July 1 can be slashed until there will be no need for new taxes.

"But any savings must be based on the administration's carrying out the recommendations being made by the Hoover commission," Taft said.

Former President Hoover has been directing a study of government organization to increase economy and efficiency in the administrative branch.

Taft's position indicated that he will throw his influence as GOP policy committee chairman behind efforts to have the Hoover recommendations adopted.

He said at least \$1,000,000,000 can be cut from proposed military costs without weakening the defense program. He said the universal military training program is "not necessary."

He also said he sees no need at this time for a \$300,000,000 spending program on new military posts.

Taft said he did not care to go into details on where he believes the budget can be cut. But his position probably is the tip-off in a strong Republican attack on the budget in the weeks to come.

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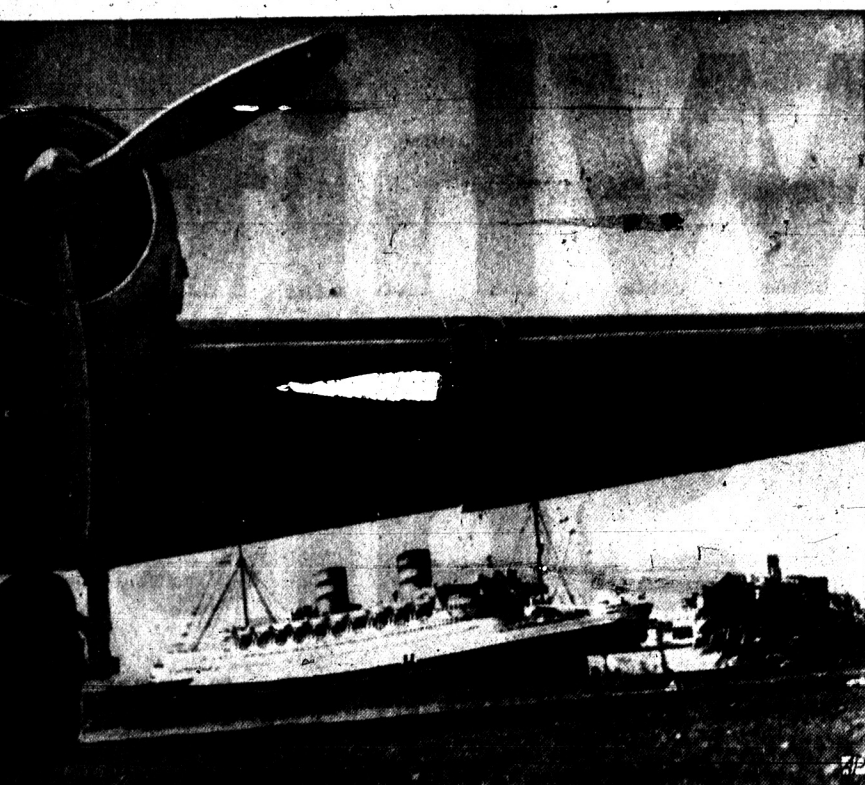

## These Days

by GEORGE E. SOLOSKY

### Immigration

For the year, ending June 30, 1948, 170,770 immigrants entered the country from all the earth. This figure does not include the displaced persons who were admitted in recent months. The largest number from abroad came from three countries, Germany, England and Italy. Canada surpassed all countries, sending 21,794 persons.

It is most interesting that women, children and elderly persons constitute an unusually large share of these immigrants. There are few mechanics, few skilled workers. For instance, those who declared that they had Occupations were clerical, sales and similar workers. Many of the immigrants were persons in the professional and semi-professional categories. For many years, more than half of the immigrants report no occupation at all. That does not mean that they have no way of earning a living; many of them are housewives who for traditional reasons are accounted occupations; others, a most valuable group, are adventurous young people who are moving to greener pastures.

This country has been importing agricultural workers since 1942 from Mexico and the British West Indies. During the war, Mexican workers were brought in to work on the railroads. Little data is available about Puerto Rican immigration to the United States.

What Type Do We Need?

The Puerto Ricans are American citizens; they move about as one might between Ohio and Pennsylvania. Many of them have settled in large cities like New York to which they were, in many instances, brought for political reasons. To be stuffed into horrible, filthy conditions, to become the prey of politicians who, for tiny benefits and small favors, got the votes they regimented. This has become a dangerous situation that calls for investigation and solution—but then politicians are involved and politicians often have their way.

The question is: What kind of immigrants do we need? What kind should be welcomed? This question always arouses emotional responses. Each national, religious

and racial group seeks to protect its kindred. It would prefer to open the gates to the United States for its own without restriction.

It was this attitude which made the displaced persons act of the 80th Congress a political issue. Obviously, the number to be admitted (205,000) was too small to satisfy everyone and therefore any formula would have produced the charge of discrimination. Any limitation would involve selection, of color, elimination. Even the quota system is discriminatory in the sense that it favors the northern European in preference to all other peoples. We discriminate against the oriental, against the African.

Current Problems

For instance, do we need farmers or mechanics? Do we need European doctors or do we need workers in certain skills? Do we require clerical workers of hard-nosed persons to do the jobs that Americans no longer like to do?

It would seem that that is a sounder approach to the problem. The United States is becoming increasingly populated. This far,

### Prostate Gland Inflammation

There are many glands located in different parts of the body and they have important functions to carry on. Then, too, there are some glands that are found only in the male.

More than two-thirds of the cases of prostate gland trouble are due to such causes as infections in the urinary tract, inflammation of the prostate gland, or blockage of this channel. The inflammation of the prostate gland is called prostatitis. It is a common condition and is usually treated with antibiotics. If there is any blockage of the passage from the bladder to the outside as a result of scar tissue formation, this must be removed by surgery if necessary.

Helpful Drug  
Drug treatment is helpful, particularly the sulfonamide preparations and penicillin. Both preparations may be used in the more severe cases.

A careful search should be made for infections in the teeth, tonsils and elsewhere in the body that might lead to prostate gland infection, and, if any are discovered, they should be eliminated.

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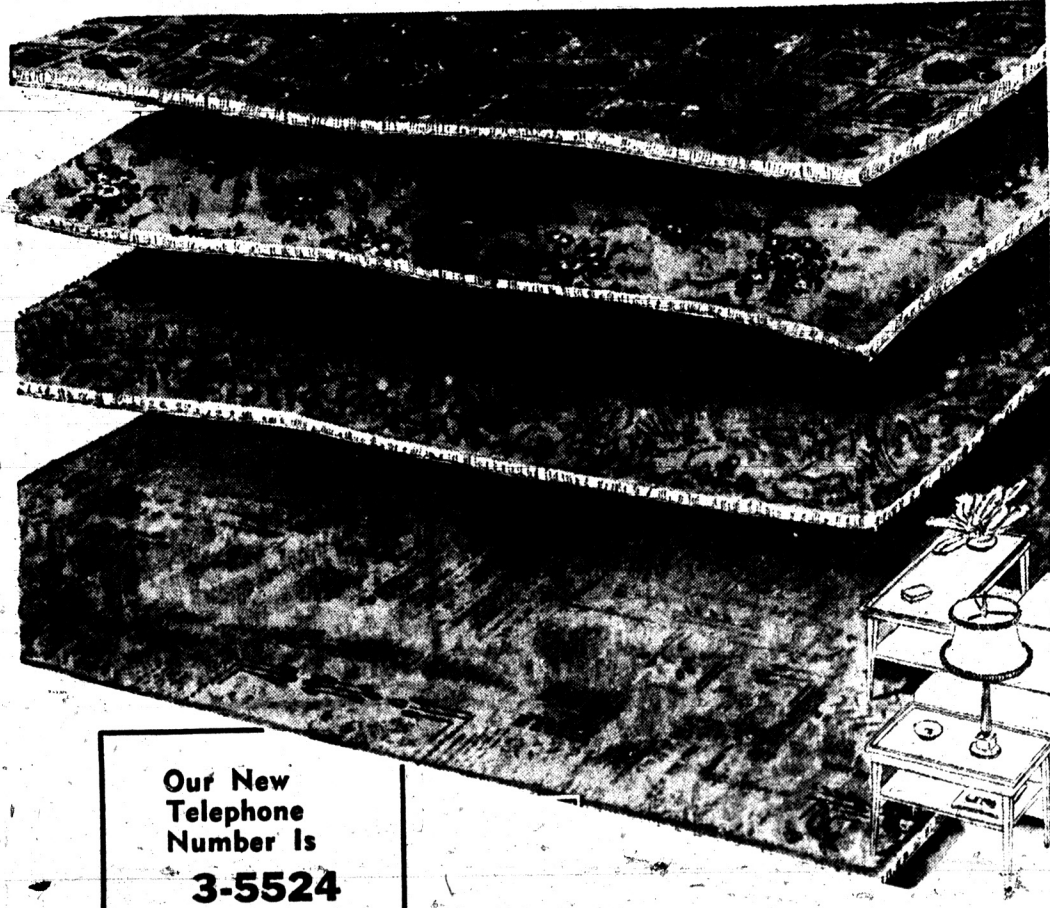
