PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — President-elect John F. Kennedy today got a report recommending sweeping Defense Department reorganization—including elimination of the civilian secretaries of Army, Navy and Air Force.

The goal would be to give the secretary of defense instantaneous control in event of nuclear war.

France Stays Away From U.N. Debate

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — France boycotted the General Assembly's Main Political Committee again today at the start of its annual debate on the six-year-old war between the French and rebellious Algerians.

The French, who consider Algeria an integral part of metropolitan France—"just as Alaska is part of the United States"—have stayed out of the perennial debate for the past several years, contending that U.N. consideration of the problem is intervention in domestic affairs which is forbidden by the charter.

Tunisian Ambassador Mongi Slim, lamenting France's absence, opened the debate by declaring that the Algerian war "increasingly causes danger to world peace and security."

Since the start of the conflict on Nov. 1, 1954, until last October, Slim said, 145,000 Algerians and 12,000 Frenchmen had been killed.

Pressure built up to postpone any strong action on the Algerian situation because of French President Charles de Gaulle's latest efforts to bring the war to an end. De Gaulle's plan was to go to French voters in January.

Although there had been speculation that a move would be made to postpone the debate, none materialized.

Red China Leader Endorses Peaceful Coexistence Idea

LONDON (UPI) — Red China's President Liu Shao-chi endorsed Russia's "peaceful coexistence" line during the weekend, but the Peiping propaganda machine continued to grind out threat of war with the West.

The Communist radio quoted Liu as saying at a banquet in Leningrad that he believes Russo-Chinese "unity and friendship... are monolithic and unbreakable."

Russian and Red Chinese broadcasts also quoted Liu to the effect that the Communist "summit meeting" in Moscow, called to try to smooth over differences between the two big Red-held nations, "strengthened the unity of the entire Communist movement."

The Chinese official was in Minsk today on a "whistle-stop" tour of the Soviet provinces. He is due back in Moscow Tuesday.

Census Shows Area Counties, Towns Growing

Iroquois Increases Officially Over 1,000 In Last Decade

Final and official census figures received from the Bureau of Census office, Washington, showed most area towns and counties have grown considerably in the last 10 years.

Iroquois County, south of Kankakee, went from 32,275 to 33,562 persons in the 10-year span, the census report showed.

Ford County, to the southwest, jumped from 15,881 in 1950 to a present count of 16,606. Livingston, directly west, went from 37,713 to 40,341.

Grundy County bordering the northwest, is presently 22,500 compared with 19,164 in 1950. Will County, a heavily populated county to the north, showed a rise from 134,499 to 191,617.

Canadian Plane Down In France

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — A Canadian Sabre jet fighter plane went out of control at 10,000 feet today and plunged into the village of Lichtenberg, killing two people and setting several houses afire.

The pilot, Flying Officer Harry Schoner of Alton, Ill., bailed out when the plane suddenly went out of control. He was not hurt.

Sources who asked not to be named said Kennedy has decided to name Rep. Stewart L. Udall, 40, D. Ariz., to the \$25,000-a-year interior post in the Cabinet.

These sources said the president-elect's present plan is to announce selection of Udall, a member of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, while in New York Wednesday. Udall, it is understood, has been asked to be on hand for the announcement.

Over the weekend, Kennedy picked the second member of his Cabinet—North Carolina Gov. Luther Hodges to be secretary of commerce. The president-elect earlier had named Gov. Abraham Ribicoff of Connecticut as secretary.

Plea For Good Will

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan today opened a conference on the future of Britain's sprawling Central African Federation with a plea for racial and political good will.

The ultimate aim of the delegates, he declared, should be the creation "in Central Africa of a way of life which all races may share in friendship."

Final Census Report Lists County Population 92,063

Kankakee County has a 1960 population of 92,063, according to an official census report received today from the Department of Commerce.

The city of Kankakee is shown with a count of 27,666 which compares with the 1950 figure of 25,856. The census is taken every 10 years by the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the Department of Commerce.

Bradley showed a gain in population from 5,383 in 1950 to 5,882 in 1960. The village at 8,082.

Bourbonnais, with a 1960 total of 3,336, had a population increase of nearly 100 per cent, considering its 1950 total of 1,738.

The census report lists other communities in the county which have a concentration of population but not necessarily legally prescribed limits, powers or functions.

The following incorporated communities with the 1950 population followed by the 1960 population: Manteno (1,949) (2,444); Herndon (1,949) (2,444); Bradleyville (1,367) (1,944); and St. Lawrence (1,367) (1,944).

The report shows that 49.1 per cent of the county population lives in urban areas or persons.

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17 White Children Are Present Today

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — White parents brought 17 children to class in an integrated school today and angry housewives abandoned their blockade around the building.

The smallest crowd of hecklers since integration began stood in front of William Frantz Elementary School today and made little effort to stop the children from entering.

But at McDonogh 19, the city's other integrated elementary school, three little Negro girls were all alone for the seventh day of classes. A white crowd there remained complete.

White children at Frantz and 7 girls—were in the bus of Ruby Nell Bridges, a 6-year-old in the first year.

The highest attendance at McDonogh 19 today was 16. When 19 was opened, it was new to the city and the school's attendance was low.

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Court Strikes Another Blow In Civil Rights

Rules Interstate Bus Restaurants Must Serve Negroes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today decided restaurants in interstate bus terminals must serve Negroes making journeys across state lines.

Justice Black delivered the 7-2 decision. Justice Whittaker wrote a dissenting opinion in which Justice Clark joined.

The ruling was based on a 1960 case involving a white woman who was refused service at a restaurant in Richmond, Va.

Boydton was fined in Police Court, under a Virginia law making it a misdemeanor to refuse to leave premises on demand of persons in charge. The law has a maximum penalty of \$100 and 30 days in jail.

Some of them waited outside the church Sunday to shout curses and insults at their most hated antagonist, the Rev. Andrew "Forrest" of St. Mark's Methodist Church.

U.S. Checks Crew From Stricken Ship

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. (AP) — Coast Guardmen plucked 17 men from a stranded ship Sunday, but the 14 crewmen of the Francisco Morazan ran into new problems with U.S. immigration officials.

The icebreaker Mackinaw, which had been standing by since shortly after the 246-foot freighter hit a reef off South Manitou Island Tuesday night, took off the captain, 13 crewmen and three insurance agents.

The Mackinaw pulled into Grand Traverse Bay around midnight and anchored off shore. Immigration officials were expected today to check the crew.

The Coast Guard said it did not know when an attempt would be made to salvage the Liberian freighter and its 900 tons of general cargo. The Morazan, which ran aground in a storm, had pounded badly on the rocks and torn holes in the bottom.

The wife of the Greek captain, Eduardo Trivizas, was removed Thursday. She is expecting a child.

T. R. Martinez, an immigration official from Detroit, said six of the ship's crew, which is made up of Spaniards, Cubans and Greeks, could be deported. He said the action was requested by Chicago immigration officials.


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
