Reds Tighten Ranks Behind Soviet Leader

Move Indicates Nikita Khrushchev At Summit Session

MOSCOW (AP) — The world Communist movement publicly closed ranks today to support Soviet Premier Khrushchev's thesis that communism can triumph without nuclear war. Khrushchev thus won a victory at last month's Communist summit meeting.

Communist China joined 80 other Communist parties in issuing a manifesto that seemed to make clear Khrushchev and his line of peaceful coexistence retain control of world communism's direction—at least for the present.

"War is not fatally inevitable. The Communist parties regard the fight for peace as their prime task," said a declaration spread across 3½ pages in Pravda.

This is what Khrushchev has insisted on since the 20th Soviet Communist party congress in 1956 which has won later endorsements from the Communist movement.

BUT THIS time he won a stamp of approval only after an embattled Communist summit meeting that opened in the Kremlin Nov. 9—the day after the U.S. elections—and continued for 21 days. The agreement that emerged, in public at least, took 20,000 words. But no one could tell how permanent was the ink in which it was written.

Communist China has held that war with the capitalist world is inevitable. This was the major difference with the Kremlin in the larger question of how the Communists should advance their cause—by a belligerent posture toward the West and encouragement of violent revolution, or by negotiation with the capitalists while communism takes over gradually.

NEWSPAPERS in London saw the manifesto as a Communist go-ahead for Khrushchev to pursue new negotiations with the West after the failure of the May summit meeting.

Communism, said the manifesto is bound to win in peace "by the force of its example."

It warned that "war is a constant companion of capitalism" but said "real forces have appeared that are capable of foiling its plans of aggression."

The manifesto called on Communist parties to unite with other like-minded groups in popular fronts, instead of continuing the Communist fight alone.

"Today in a number of capitalist countries the working class, headed by its vanguard (the Communist party), has the opportunity to unite a majority of the people, win state power without civil war and ensure the transfer of the basic means of production to the hands of the people," the manifesto said.

Massive Doses Of Perfume Fail In Paris Subway

PARIS (AP)—Despite massive doses of perfume, most Paris subway stations still smell like a football team's locker room at half-time.

Appoint 13 To Bradley Positions

President Glenn Mulligan, sitting in Bradley's executive chair for the second time, appointed 13 persons to village posts at the first December meeting of the village board Monday night.

The appointments were made after a Mulligan sponsored ordinance, amending an ordinance governing appointments to the zoning board of appeals, passed unanimously after a motion by Trustee Leslie Johnson.

Mulligan then appointed Jack Tutewiler, Donald Chaplinski, Russell DuFrain and Earl Swafford to the zoning board. They will join three other members, Robert Matthews, Bradford Fegan and Crosby Brouillette, already on the board. Approval of their appointments came after a motion by Johnson.

THE NEW ORDINANCE has the term each of the zoning members staggered. Matthews was appointed for seven years, Fegan for six, Brouillette for five, Tutewiler for four, Chaplinski for three, DuFrain for two and Swafford for one. In this way, newly appointed members will continuously join experienced members.

Mulligan then appointed a new 11-member planning commission, which includes Matthews, Fegan, and Brouillette, who will serve three year terms with this body. The other eight members, including the ex-officio village president, have staggered terms of from one to seven years and are, respectively, Ray Doude, Louis Drassier, Gene Huelsmann, Ray Outson, Rudy Jagersma, Les McClure and Elton Guis. Their names were approved after a motion by Utech.

Also appointed by Mulligan was a new building inspector, Louis Beland, who replaces Fred Miller. Miller, who had been serving as a temporary inspector on 30-day appointments by former President William Barwegen, sent his resignation to the board, but it took no action Monday since it had never recognized him officially.

BELAND ANNOUNCED that he would be on duty at the Municipal Building on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 7 p.m. His pay is fixed by a recently passed ordinance, designed to bring the village, Continued on Page 6, Col. 2

Bourbonnais Fire Dispute Flares Anew

District Asks Court To Compel Building Permit

The smoldering dispute between the village of Bourbonnais and the Bourbonnais Rural Fire Protection District has broken out anew.

The district has petitioned Circuit Court for an order which would compel the village building inspector to issue a permit for alteration and repair of its proposed fire station.

The fire protection district applied June 15 for a permit to convert the former Kankakee Broom Factory into a fire station.

The petition for a writ of mandamus charges that Paul A. Roy, the building inspector, has refused to issue the permit although plans are "in full and complete compliance with" the village building ordinance.

When the application was brought to the attention of the village board last July, it was denounced as an effort to set up a second fire department in the village.

The village has its own fire department but both the village and rural units pool their equipment for fires inside and outside the corporate limits.

The dispute between the two organizations arose more than two years ago when the village board failed to reappoint Armand LeCuyer as fire chief. He had held the post for 15 years.

Coincidentally, Roy, named respondent in the petition for the writ, serves as the fire chief now.

Countries Getting Aid Will Have To Buy More In U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter has issued an order designed to force countries receiving U. S. aid to spend more of that money in the United States.

The order carries out one of a number of moves directed by President Eisenhower last month to reduce the flow of gold and dollars from the United States to other countries.

It does not force the countries to buy American goods but it forbids them to spend the money in most of the other Western industrialized countries.

The order, issued Monday, put 18 countries and the British colony of Hong Kong on the forbidden list for purchases with U. S. foreign aid money. The State Department said the United States considers them in strong economic shape.

The countries on the list are Australia, Austria, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Luxembourg, Monaco, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.

U.S. Army Lifts Ban On Weddings

TOKYO (AP)—The U. S. Army today lifted a two-week-old ban on soldiers marrying Japanese girls or adopting children.

Following President Eisenhower's order to reduce the number of dependents overseas, a spokesman said, the Army had to stop the marrying and adopting long enough to get a true count of how many dependents it had.

Boycott Shows Signs Of Weakening In Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Twenty-three white children went to classes in integrated William Frantz School today, spared the worst of the usual jeers from pickets because police cleared a one-block area around the building.

While the gap in the segregation boycott widened, New Orleans legislators prepared to ask the Orleans Parish School Board to re-

sign, the New Orleans States-Item reported.

Rep. Risley C. Triche, an administration house floor leader, said: "I don't see any way for the schools to be financed unless the school board steps aside."

Vandals dumped red paint on the porch of the home formerly occupied by the Rev. Lloyd Foreman, a rallying point in return-to-school moves.

POLICE QUESTIONED scores of persons and Supt. Joseph Giarrusso said he expected an arrest.

In the face of the move to get their resignations, members of the board today filed a suit asking four New Orleans banks to show cause why they should not honor school board checks.

The Louisiana Legislature has frozen state funds in New Orleans banks to keep the present school board from paying bills. The legal struggle between legislature and school board has kept banks from loaning \$12 million to finance payrolls in coming months.

The boycott held firm at the city's other integrated school, McDonogh No. 19. Only three Negro first-grade girls entered classes there.

There still was no immediate way to tell if the lone Negro first-grade girl in William Frantz had white girls in her class. Eight of the 23 white children were first-graders, but if they were all boys the 6-year-old Negro girl would

ON THE HEELS OF a Nov. 21 council move which concurred in the recommendation of the planning commission to rezone property on Court Street between Wildwood and Hobbie Avenues, another petition for rezoning an adjacent area was submitted to the council Monday.

President And Kennedy Talk For 3 Hours

Senator Reports Eisenhower Was Extremely Helpful

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower held a "cordial" three-hour meeting with President-elect John F. Kennedy today and assured him he would be glad to be of "future service to the country."

Emerging from the White House, Kennedy said he asked Eisenhower whether he would be willing to undertake an assignment if requested after he leaves the White House on Jan. 20.

Kennedy told reporters that the President replied he would be willing to be of service to the country at any time.

Kennedy did not indicate whether he had a specific assignment in mind or whether he was merely sounding out the President should he decide at some time to call upon him for help.

Kennedy made the statement to newsmen after meeting with the President at the White House.

Eisenhower and Kennedy talked alone in the President's oval-shaped office for an hour and 45 minutes and then walked to the Cabinet room where they met with three Eisenhower Cabinet members.

KENNEDY DESCRIBED the President as being "extremely helpful" and said he had been "very careful" to make the transition easier.

The president-elect said Eisenhower said he would be delighted to hold another session of this nature and Kennedy told reporters he might very well accept the offer.

"He has gone to great pains and today's meeting was an extension of that," Kennedy said.

After Kennedy said that the President had told him he was willing to be of service to the country at any time, he was asked whether the President had volunteered that or whether he had asked him about it.

"I asked him," Kennedy said. Joining in the Eisenhower-Kennedy discussions were Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Defense Secretary Thomas C. Gates Jr., and Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson.

Eisenhower's top staff aide, Maj. Gen. Wilton M. Persons and Kennedy's liaison man with the outgoing administration, Clark Clifford, joined the discussions in the Cabinet room.

A JOINT Eisenhower-Kennedy statement was expected after the conferences end.

Eisenhower was waiting on the front porch of the White House to welcome Kennedy when the president-elect drove up at 8:02 a.m. CST.

Kennedy's only words on arrival were "Good morning, Mr. President" as he stepped briskly up the six steps to shake hands with Eisenhower.

"Senator, I'd have come down there but these photographers wouldn't let me do it," the chief executive laughingly told the president-elect in explanation of why he had not been at the bottom of the steps to greet him. It was their first meeting since Kennedy's election Nov. 8.

Blood Program At Time Of Decision

Time of decision has arrived for Kankakee County and the Red Cross blood program.

Visits of the bloodmobile to the county this week will determine whether the county will be able to continue in the program—a program that features blood at a moment's notice, made available at only costs of administering it.

The bloodmobile will be at Olivet College from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Thursday.

It will be at Kankakee First Methodist Church from noon to 6 p.m. Friday.

Dr. James Turner, county chairman of the blood program, pointed out that according to Peoria Regional Blood Center regulations Kankakee County must have contributed 90 per cent of the blood it has used to remain in the program. At the end of each six-month period if the 90 per cent of usage has not been maintained by a county its Red Cross officials are summoned to determine if there is any hope the ensuing

six months could raise the contributions to the 90 per cent figure.

DECEMBER IS the end of the first six-month period since the new plan went into effect. Dr. Turner says the first five months showed county residents contributing 92.8 per cent of usage. He predicted that usage during December would be about 225 pints—thus that would be the minimum of pints needed in this week's visit to assure the county of continuing in the program.

Dr. Turner praised residents for their giving the past two months. Continued on Page 6, Column 2

Church Addition Is Nearing Completion

The new \$115,000 addition to College Church of the Nazarene is approximately 80 per cent completed, the Rev. Forest Nash, pastor, reported Monday, and should be finished by Feb. 1 if work progresses on schedule.

The addition to the south of the five-year old 1,000 person sanctuary consists of an extension of the transept unit and a three-story educational building. It follows the Colonial-style architecture of the first building with red brick trimmed in white.

Workmen Monday were putting windows in the transept unit and plastering in the educational unit. Only plastering, painting and finishing carpenter work remains to be done.

The new section will add approximately 10,000 square feet of floor space to existing facilities. The transept, including an overflow, will add a capacity of 225 persons to the sanctuary. The educational building will accommodate about 500 persons.

The new addition is designed for even further expansion, the Rev. Mr. Nash said.

For this first step, a section of the south wall will be knocked out of the sanctuary to provide access to the transept unit. If needed, the transept could be extended forward to the front of the sanctuary and tentative plans call for another transept northward.

Completion of this last step would create a "cruciform" design.

The educational building will include a multi-purpose area on the ground floor for week night activities for youth. The second floor will house adult Sunday school classes and the third floor will house college-age Sunday school classes.

The best man was Claude Schultz. Ushers were Gene Retke, nephew of the bridegroom, and Bill Sang.




